If Mr. Hill is getting mighty busy building a road into Tillamook County, let's all get busy also and help bring about improvements, for Tillamook is the garden spot of Oregon, the dairyman's paradise and with plenty of opportunities for manufacturing purposes. Tillamook people will give Mr. Hill the glad hand and it is to be hoped our commercial bodies will do everything to welcome Hill's road into Tillamook. There may be a few attempts to block it, but Hill will get here, nevertheless.

The snap shot man is wondering when that hydrant in the center of the sidewalk near the school house is to be arrested for creating a darn nuisance. But it would be more proper to arrest the individual who was responsible for leaving the hydrant in the center of the walk. We will gamble if Jim's Mike had been tied down in the center of the side walk and people had taken a tumble

over the animal in the darkness he would be yanked off to the pound by the city marshal. We feel like getting as hot in the collar as those who have stumbled onto the hydrant in the darkness. County Commissioner Alley was in Portland and accepted the road roller, rock crusher and engine that was ordered recently for the north part of the county. This makes three complete road building plants in the county, which, if placed in the hands of competent and experienced persons, should accomplish a great deal of good road work. The county court made no mistake when it bought these equipment, for it was money well expended. Money will buy any and all kinds of road building appliances, but it takes skill and experience to run them successfully and economically, otherwise they are an expensive luxury. All will agree with us in this particular. However, some plan should be devised to work the road plants systematically and economically. As there is no practical head or engineer to plan out or take charge of road building or to intelligently advise the county court, it appears to us more road plants, more need is there for an experienced engineer at the head of road building. Another thing most observant persons readily admit, and that is, that it takes too much money to do very little work in some districts. Probably some people will imagine the editor has wheels in his head, yet we find but few persons defending the present system, while, on the other hand, scores of persons will point out where the leakage is and why the county is not getting better roads for the large amount of money expended. We are somewhat opposed to creating more offices, but it would be economy to pay a practical engineer a good salary and give him charge of the road work under the court's supervision than to keep on with present system—we should have said want of system, for it has no practical head, and as long as this

continues no one need expect to see the best results obtained for the money expended.

Tillamook Jottings.

STEVENS IS HEAD OF UNITED ROADS.

With Election, Construction of Tillamook Line Is Expected at Once.

With the election of John F. Stevens, president of the Oregon Trunk Railway, to the presidency of the United Railways Company, the construction of the line to Tillamook will be rushed to completion, immediately upon the securing of the final rights-of-way and the finishing of surveys upon which Chief Engineer Wickersham's men have been working.

Exactly in accordance with the statement made by James J. Hill to The Oregonian, following the banquet tendered him by Theodore B. Wilcox, was the meeting of the board of directors of the United Railways. Mr. Hill said that Mr. Stevens would have control of all Hill electric lines in Oregon. He added that he hoped there would be no change in the management of the lines.

At the meeting of the board Thomas L. Greenough and C. D. Fullen tendered their resignations as president and vice-president. Mr. Stevens was promptly nominated and elected president and L. B. Wickersham, chief engineer, was elected vice-president. Mr. Stevens said Mr. Wickersham would hold the dual position of vice-president and chief engineer. There were no other changes in the personnel of the organization.

Another Post for Stevens.

A meeting of the board of directors of the Oregon Electric Railway will be held in a few days and President Stevens will then be elected to head that organization. At that time, it is expected, Mr. Hill will make the necessary appointments of traffic and general managers.
