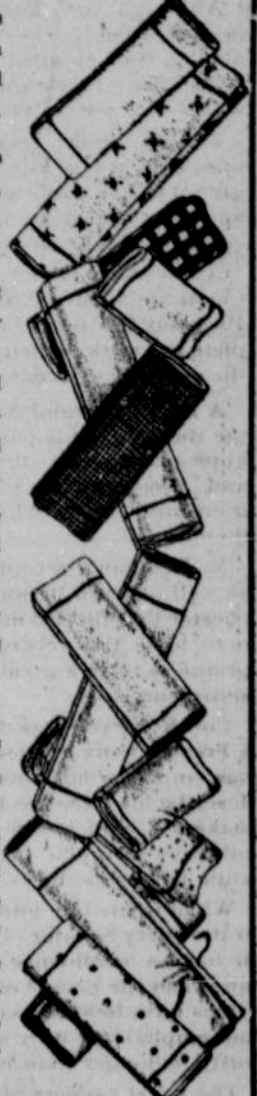

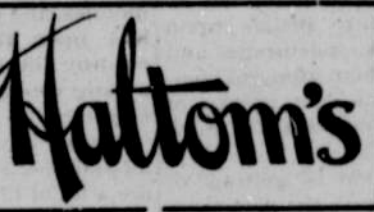

 C. L. Houston, who has been awarded the contract to construct the jetty at the mouth of the Nehalem River, states that work will be commenced at once, and the \$50,000 appropriated for the purpose will permit construction of about 500 ft, and he expects to have this completed about January 1. He has secured a rock quarry near by on the railroad and, as the jetty will start directly from it, the handling of the rock will be simple, and in that vicinity there will be no trouble of securing all the piling necessary.
