

Editorial Snap Shots.

It would be a good thing for the business men of Astoria to visit this county. Tillamook county last year manufactured and disposed of \$500,000 worth of cheese, and as Clatsop county is equally well adapted to dairying, this is an industry the business men of Astoria could learn much about and then go home and help boost that industry in their own county.

It is right and proper that prisoners serving time in the county jail should be put to work on the county roads, for there is no sense in keeping several able-bodied men in idleness. There is a whole raft of bootleggers who should be included in the chain gang who are too lazy to do a honest day's labor for a livelihood. Get busy, Mr. Sheriff, and put them to work.

Some months ago the matter of drawing up a new city charter and extending the city limits to take in the railroad depot was freely discussed, but, somehow, the bottom appears to have dropped out of the whole affair and there is nothing doing. That being the case, when the newly formed Tillamook Commercial Club is ready for business it wouldn't be out of place for that body to take action.

It seems that "upper town" and "lower town" at Nehalem will no longer be at odds, for it looks as if the newly platted town of Wheeler will become the metropolis of the north part of the county. We hope to see a good sized city with several thousand inhabitants, for that part of the county is emerging from its long isolation and rapidly coming to the front. Bully for those who have turned in with a determination to up-build and develop it.

The building of the electric road into Tillamook County will do wonders in bringing in people and in developing the county. We have waited patiently for many years to see one phase of the transportation problem solved. The next order of business will be the improvement of Hoquarton Slough, the channel in the bay and a jetty for Tillamook bar. We have often prophesied that Tillamook would be a second Grays harbor for lumbering, and the rapid manner in which this is coming about is very gratifying.

As the Port of Nehalem had the nerve and grit to tackle the improvement of Nehalem bar, surely the P. R. of Tillamook ought not to be so slow in having a little nerve and grit in taking up the improvement of the water front and the slough. As we put this into type the Sue H. Elmore is stuck fast at the mouth of the slough, interfering with the commerce of the port as well as giving it a bad reputation. It may be, however, that some steps are being taken to bring about this long delayed and much needed improvement.

The Pacific City Lookout, edited by H. S. Turner, is the name of a new county paper published at Pacific City, issued to boost and boom that seaside resort. We hope, however, that it will not prove a boom-crang to that place, for an editor who persistently pushes his anarchistic-socialistic nostrums to the front, pulling down and never building up, isn't likely to make a good booster for Tillamook County's famous seaside resorts. Cut it out, Bro. Turner, and turn in and be a real live booster and boomer for Pacific City.

It matters little or nothing to us as to who is responsible for the hydrant being placed in the center of the sidewalk near the school house. What we want to see is the hydrant lined up to the sidewalk or the sidewalk lined up to the hydrant. That is all that is necessary to overcome the difficulty. There appears to be some difference of opinion as to who

is responsible for the situation, but no matter as to that, line the street up as correct as possible, gentlemen, and remove the nuisance, and in this way put a stop to the criticism that is being indulged in.

We think we remember at one time that there was rejoicing at the city on the bay when the Lytle road contemplated building down Willson river and making Bay City the terminus. But it didn't, though. No railroad building into Tillamook can afford to close its eyes to the splendid locations for factories and saw mills on Hoquarton Slough and Tillamook, Trask and Wilson rivers, and out of the reach of the rough weather at times on the Tillamook bay in the winter. We have always expected to see the bulk of the timber manufactured around Tillamook City, and in a few years the places we have mentioned will become beehives of the lumber industry because the locations are ideal for that purpose, and for that reason the Hill people are not going to overlook these facts.

It is plain to see that it is going to be hard work to get together and pull together for the best interest of Tillamook City when those who control the Herald are endeavoring to keep up the factional strife. Anyone can see that the renewed attack on the snap shot man and the post office is for political reasons. It matters little or nothing to us, for we have been the target of the "knockers" and the politicians for so many years that we have become accustomed to it. Anyway, if Bro. Trombley is content to be the tool in the hands of those who want to keep up the factional strife in this city, well and good, keep on "knocking," "knocking," "knocking," and help undo what the Commercial Club is endeavoring to do to bring about harmony and united effort for the up-building of the city and county. Yet it is well to state that the "honking machine," with very little discretion and less brains, has been the cause of a good deal of strife, political and otherwise. "Honk!" "Honk!" "Honk!"

Tillamook City should extend the glad hand to the Hill road, with the same welcome spirit that it extended to the P. R. & N. Co. We mention this because it is reported that obstacles will be placed in the way of the electric road. Tillamook County has enough undeveloped resources to become important feeders for both the Harriman and Hill railroad systems and a big shipping trade as well, and for that reason all should rejoice because the county is to be grid-ironed with an electric as well as a steam road, and we feel sure that the newly formed Tillamook Commercial Club will give a helping and welcome hand to the Hill road. It has already shown a lively interest in this matter by inviting Mr. L. W. Hill to visit Tillamook. All doubt as to the road being built is removed, for it seems to be the general impression that as soon as the surveys are complete the work will be rushed to completion.

There are a great many things that are more needed in Tillamook City than a Fourth of July celebration this year. The money spent for a celebration could be expended to far better advantage in public and private improvements. There is too much commercialism connected with Fourth of July celebrations in this city—a few business men advocating them simply for the purpose of doing a big business that day. Instead of a celebration, and to help create a greater interest in raising pure bred stock, there should be a County Stock Show in this city every year. It would do more good and help our principle industry, and would be the proper thing too, to offer a number of prizes to the stock raisers, dairy men, cheese factories and creameries than to fool away a thousand dollars or more on fireworks, etc., imported from China. Let everything that is taken in hand in the future be to up build the city and county, not a few business men who have a mercenary interest in Fourth of July celebrations.

The truth has come out at last. It now develops that Bay City is to be the terminus of the United Electric Railway which is to be built immediately from Portland to Tillamook Bay. It simply means that Bay City is to be the terminus of the North Bank road.

James J. Hill, the empire builder, has said that Portland cannot be a sea port and he is therefore looking for a better outlet to the Pacific seaboard, and that Tillamook Bay is his choice. Mr. Hill's agents, as is well known, have been busy securing terminal grounds and rights of way, for the new line will begin at the North edge of the City limits joining the P. R. & N. track, parallel said road through Bay City South as far as necessary to strike the Wilson river valley, where it will cross the P. R. & N. and turn Eastward up said river toward Portland, probably throwing out a spur to Tillamook City. Thus it is seen that great events will be crowding fast upon one another and that Bay City, the

'City of Destiny', once despised and ridiculed is coming into her own.—Bay City News.

Rah! Rah! Rah! For Bay City! But Tillamook City is thankful for the spur that Bro. Miller has given it. Yet for all that Tillamook City is just as liable, and more so, to be made the terminus of the electric road as Bay City.

Beaver Grange has passed resolutions opposed to the Republican or any other party holding conventions or assemblies. That being the case it is now perfectly proper for the political parties in this county to pass resolutions in opposition to the Grange holding conventions. It is a poor rule that won't work both ways. At the last county election the socialists and the prohibitionists held conventions and the democrats held a caucus and nominated their tickets, but now that the republicans propose to get together and hold a convention or assembly for the purpose of discussing republican policies and selecting suitable candidates to represent them, a great rompus is made. Fraternal orders, Granges, church, labor and other organizations all adhere to the representative system of conducting their business and electing their officers, and we take the position that the republican and other parties should enjoy the same privileges and enjoy the same liberties without having to submit to the dictation of "unscrupulous politicians" who may happen to control Grange meetings. Not only does the Beaver Grange assume the role of dictator, but it proposes to boycott any candidate receiving a nomination through the assembly (a representative gathering), but it has no fault to find with the method adopted in this county two years ago when a few persons got together and nominated candidates and made up "slates" for the socialist, prohibitionist and democratic parties in this county. Talk about political humbug and "unscrupulous politicians," as well as freak legislation, surely republicans have gone through a sad experience and met with so many defeats that they should be getting onto the racket kicked up by the autocrats who are undertaking to dictate to the republican party how and in what manner it shall conduct its organization and nominate its officers. We do not know whether there will be an assembly in this county, for that is a matter for the republican county committee to decide, and whatever is their decision all true blue republicans should abide by.

Wants Tillamook Trade.

With the coming of additional transportation facilities to the county of Tillamook from Portland and other points to transport the products already produced there, Astoria will lose the trade she now enjoys if some effort is not made by the businessmen to retain it.

With Astoria as the largest center of population the outlying district naturally look toward this section for suggestions, support and application of ideas. It becomes the duty of the business men to make regular pilgrimages to different points for the purpose of not only increasing their own business, but to ascertain the needs of others so that by their influence and general co-operation the county can develop along scientific and dependable lines.

Let the business men of Astoria look up a little from their daily routine and devote a portion of their time and energies toward the uplift of the community at large. Set a time to visit the Tillamook country and learn what the building up of that section means to Astoria.—Astoria Daily Budget.

During this time if a man wants an outing with the chance of may be getting one or two trout or with an equal one of hooking a steel head, all well and good, but he must put out of his head all ideas of making a big catch as the trout are on the riffles devouring the fry as they hatch out and they have lost no flies. Before the trout get on the spawning grounds, say in March and April, some big catches may be made, especially at the mouths of the rivers, but after that the fishing is poor until the fry get big enough to take care of themselves.

I have heard of big catches being made during the time I mention, but those fishermen can beat me all to fits. I have cast a fly in the streams of California and Oregon for the last 40 years. There are no two streams that fish exactly alike, and I am now speaking more especially of the Kilchis, which river I have fished for 30 years.

Base Ball Opens in Tillamook.

Friday was a half holiday in Tillamook for the baseball season of 1910 was officially opened here with a game between the Tillamook "Clam Diggers" and the Columbia Hardware Company team, of Portland. It was a fast and exciting game from start to finish and resulted in a victory for Tillamook by the score of 5 to 3.

"Collie" Druhot, the little left-handed pitcher from Portland, officiated on the slab for Tillamook, and he not only pitched an elegant game for the home club, but he distinguished himself by rapping out a two-base hit, with the bases full, in the eighth inning, which virtually won the game for the "Clam Diggers."

Tillamook Scores.

Tillamook scored in the first, when Howard Guyn was hit by a pitched ball and went to second when Druhot walked. Catcher Jones, formerly with Tacoma, hit to left field, and Guyn, the former Beaver, trotted home with the first run.

In the third inning Stokes, of the visiting team, was safe on an error and took second on a sacrifice hit, and scored when Mead doubled to left. This tied the score, and the rival clubs battled along until the eighth inning before the register was again crossed.

The Columbia Hardware team then put two runs over. Siggsbee fanned. Mead popped to Druhot, but "Shorty" Duvall drove one through Armbruster at short-stop for Tillamook. Anderson hit to right, and a long single by Douglass chased Duvall and Anderson over, giving the hardware lads the lead by a score of 3 to 1.

Big Leaguers Get Busy.

In Tillamook's half the former Pacific Coast League players distinguished themselves nobly. Edmunds led off with a single, and passes to Guyn and Armbruster filled the bases, with Druhot at bat. "Collie" took a firm grip on his bat and shot a two-bagger to deep center, which sent Edmunds, Guyn and Armbruster home. Druhot later scored on Diehl's hit to right, which gave Tillamook a total of four runs in the inning and five for the game, two more runs than the visitors were able to accumulate.

The features of the game were the pitching of Druhot who fanned 14 men, and the fielding of Diehl at first base. This is the first game of three. All of the automobiles in Tillamook county participated in the parade before the game, and the largest crowd in the history of baseball in the county was on hand to see the first baseball contest of the season.
