Death of Lela Margaret Owen.

Died, May 22nd, at Tillamook, Oregon, Lela Margaret Owen, oldest daughter of William and Delphia Owen. The deceased was born at Tillamook, Oregon, May 16, 1902, being 8 years and 6 days old. She had been ill only a short time, but acute pneumonia proved fatal, in spite of medical skill and the most careful nursing.

Lela was a child exceptionally lovable in disposition, and with unusual devotion to her parents and thoughtfulness for all with whom she came in contact. In the home she was a bright ray of sunshine, ever ready to help, and with her playmates at school one whom they all loved and looked to for example of integrity.

The services were held at the home on Long Prairie, at 11 a. m. May 23rd, Rev. Fowler, of the Adventist Church officiating, assisted by the choir of the same church. The remains were interred at the Johnson cemetery, where another brief service was held. Six of the young friends of deceased acted as pall bearers.
