The contracts for carrying the mail have been let: Hance Wilks, to Netarts, six times a week, for \$500; H. C. Brown, between this city and Willamina, six times a week, for \$884, except Saturday, leaving Tillamook City at 12 noon; George W. Grayson, the North Yamhill route for \$5,800; Albert E. Wilks, to Bayocan, twice a week, for \$420; Arthur E. Holden, to Bay City and Hobsonville, seven times a week, \$1,230.

At a meeting of the city council on Monday evening, the committee on health and police was instructed to call upon the citizens to clean up their premises.
