Therefore, be it resolved that Oretown Grange here assembled, declare ourselves opposed to any scheme by designing or unscrupulous politicians to nullify said law, by the holding of a so-called "Assembly," or any other means or attempt to nullify said law, or take from the people the right to choose by individual ballot who shall serve them.

And, further, that we oppose any pre-election "Assembly" whereby one candidate may obtain unmerited advantage over his opponent for nomination, support or endorsement from or through said assembly plan, or any candidate known to be a sympathizer with or in favor of said plan.
