The new building of the International Bureau of the American Republics, recently dedicated here, will be the home of the bureau, which represents a union of twenty-one republican nations of the new world, bound together by common consent, without treaty obligation, to work for the advancement of peace, friendship and commerce in the new world.

The Palace of Peace.

The building itself, which is called the palace of peace, is the most typical expression of American art, American business and American philanthropy anywhere to be found.

The establishment of "the Playhouse" has met with popular favor here. Only the members can have their plays produced in this new home, which will combine the advantages of a theater, club, restaurant and ball-room.

"The Playhouse" will be located at 814 N street, northwest. Costly furniture, rare tapestry, valuable paintings and elaborate bric-a-brac will in all probability be contributed.
