City Council Meeting.

The regular meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, when Mayor Thos. Coates and Councilmen Brodhead, Laughlin, Wilt, Harrison and Zachmann were present.

Mayor Coates announced that he had received \$100 from an anonymous donor, \$50 to be used in the improvement of Stillwell Park and \$50 to be given as a prize to the person who collects the largest amount of money to be used also in the improvement of the park.

Marshal Ford handed in his resignation to take effect on the 1st of August, which was accepted, and W. T. Kimball made application for the position. The matter was referred to the committee on health and police.

Frank Elliott submitted an ordinance to permit him to construct a wharf on Hoquarion Slough, which was passed to its second reading.

A resolution was submitted and passed authorizing the mayor to appoint a committee of three to

revise the city charter, the mayor also to serve on the committee with a like number to be appointed by the Tillamook Commercial Club. The mayor appointed Councilmen Harrison, Brodhead and Laughlin, and President Holmes, of the Commercial Club, appointed Jaues Walton, B. C. Lamb and Frank Severance.

Attorney Willett, in behalf of the Merchants' Protective Association, complained to the council of large quantities of gasoline being stored on the water front, and the attorney was authorized to draw up and submit an ordinance to overcome the danger.

The sum of \$30 was donated for the purpose of building a walk connecting the walks already built by Messrs. Coates and Hadley.
