The Charges Against Mr. Hofer.
PORTLAND, July 15.—(To the Editor.)—In the Portland Journal of last evening there appears a synopsis of an alleged editorial in the Salem Journal in which Mr. Hofer "demands" that Mr. Moores produce the letter of "a prominent citizen of Salem," preferring charges against him, and the name of the writer who filed them.
Mr. Hofer is famous for his methods of indirection, for "striking an attitude," and for making mock heroic demands in double-leaded editorials for the Capital Journal. His assumption of ignorance as to the writer and as to the contents of the letter referred to is pure affectation; he knows that a direct and a polite request would secure the letter as well as a "demand," but it would not be so dramatic.
He was mistaken in supposing a copy of the letter was not accessible. As may be supposed, our personal relations are not friendly, but I bear him no malice, and will not intentionally do him an injustice. For nearly 20 years the columns of his paper have reeked with personal abuse of almost every man who has ever taken part in the public affairs of Marion County or of the State of Oregon. It seems impossible for him to discuss any public question without impugning the motives or questioning the honor of those who differ with him.
In his latest effusion he kindly refers to me as "one who stands for the sacred rights of predatory political methods." Such a man, especially when posing as a leader, and conducting a campaign for the Governorship of the state, cannot hope to escape an inquiry as to his own personal and political methods. Such inquiry fairly prosecuted, is entirely legitimate. We assume that Mr. Hofer concedes this much and that he desires the letter referred to published so that he may openly meet the charges and completely dissipate every doubt as to his own purity of character.

He's A Ranter.
The one newspaper in Oregon which will contribute most largely to defeat the republican party in the coming political contest in this state is the Capital Journal, edited by Mr. Hofer, who is offering his name for nomination for governor to the malcontents of the party. Fortunately, there are two redeeming features to the situation; one being the constipated circulation of his paper and the other the positive assurance of the party this fall. Col. Hofer to the contrary, notwithstanding. He is doing everything in his power to damage the party everything except adding readers to his paper. It goes without saying that he is not adding many readers through the influence of his rantings which are becoming almost a nightly nightmare to him. With an audience Mr. Hofer and his set contribute to democratic victory as sure as anything.
If there is a yellow streak in a newspaper it's bound to show up sooner or later.—Independence Enterprise.

A Retort.
EDITOR OF TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.
Some one sent me a copy of yours of the 7th, containing Justice Effenberger's long-winded effusion about his court proceedings. The time checks issued by time keepers at the different camps are non-transferable, but when the same are indorsed by J. W. Sweeney Construction Co., by the Paymaster, they are negotiable as bank checks. The business men of Nehalem, including Justice Effenberger, have purchased the indorsed negotiable time checks and collected the same through their bank, as they would bank checks. Now, the old Justice should have told your readers "the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth." He knows, for he has done it all of his life.
He issued a warrant for my arrest, accusing me of "the crime of issuing non-transferable time checks." He did so on his own motion, no complaint being sworn to. The Justice is as capable to run his court as the proverbial jack rabbit.

Here is the letter:
October, 27, 1909.—Hon. Fred W. Carpenter, Washington D.C.
Dear Sir: It is generally understood by public men in this state that Senator Bourne is to present to President Taft the name of E. Hofer, a local editor of this city, for a Federal position, presumably Collector of Customs for the Port of Portland, Oregon.
As protest in the name of common decency does not appeal favorably to Senator Bourne, I protest through you to the President against this proposed appointment.
As to my moral and financial responsibility, I refer you to Hon. Francis J. Heney, San Francisco, Cal.; Hon. W. B. Gilbert, U. S. Circuit Judge, Portland, Or., and Hon. William H. Hunt, U. S. District Judge, Helena, Mont.
Mr. Hofer has, for more than 15 years, published a small daily paper in this city, sometimes in the interest of the Republican party, at other times in the interest of the People's party, the Free Silver Republican party and as independent.

Shortly after he commenced the paper, it became noised about that his paper could be purchased to advocate or condemn any person or measure, for money. At this time, and for many years last past, his general representation has been, and is now, that of grafter. I can furnish you a list of the leading men of the city, including lawyers, doctors, clergymen, merchants and judges upon the bench, all of whom will say that Hofer's reputation for being a grafter is not disputable. It is accepted here as a fact all persons know, as the recurrence of the season, the rise and fall of the tides, and the phases of the moon.
It may be a good thing for Senator Bourne to pay political debts by making such appointments, but it appears to me this Administration cannot knowingly be a party to this proposed debasement of the public service. After having advised you of this condition, the Administration cannot escape responsibility without investigating the charges I make.
This letter is not private and it may be shown to Mr. Hofer, to Senator Bourne, or given to the public. I am financially responsible, and am prepared to substantiate these charges before any official who may care to investigate them on behalf of the Government and before any jury of my fellow citizens. In writing this letter, Mr. McMahan has assumed the grave responsibility of being required, by every consideration of fairness, to sustain beyond question all of his charges, and in "demanding" its publication Mr. Hofer is placed under like responsibility of refuting every charge. One or the other of these gentlemen should be blotted out of Oregon politics. The grafter and the coiner of false charges are in the same category. It is not a mere personal controversy. There is a higher and graver question of decent political methods involved.

Why Newspapers Fail.
Ninety-five per cent of the men starting newspapers fail.
Sometimes the paper dies when the publisher becomes bankrupt, sometimes it passes through a series of owners, nearly all of whom lose their investment, until the time, the field and the right man come together.
There are more business fools in the printing and publishing game than in almost any occupation.
The revenue to support a publication can be figured per capita of population. If the available revenue be concentrated into one channel, the output is a better product than if scattered into several. One institution that pays its bill is better for the community than several that don't.
The responsible man who understands the newspaper business will not risk his capital, time and energy in a new venture unless the population, present and prospective, justifies it. Even then it is a matter of years, usually, before the venture is a money maker.
The irresponsible, with shoe-string capital, having little to lose, is willing to gamble. He may be a born rain-bow chaser, or he may expect to "sting" someone.—Medford Mail Tribune.

Rev. Dr. John D. Long, formerly secretary of the Christian Socialist Fellowship, who was put out of the Presbyterian church in Brooklyn for his socialist activities, has now withdrawn from the Socialist party of which he became a member. Dr. Long said he did not approve the tactics of the New York Socialists, but that he would go on preaching the socialism of the golden rule, and to do that he thought he was better off not connected with any political party. His church continues as an independent organization.

Forty-two thousand cases of fresh eggs which reached South Water Street, Chicago, were bought up and placed in cold storage by the combine, which is forcing upon the retail trade, and thus upon the public, its old eggs, placed in cold storage last year, or maybe two years ago. In New York, where eggs were 60 cents a dozen last winter, it was discovered that one warehouse of the meat trust in Jersey City held 35,000,000 dozen of eggs. Now if the trusts may deprive the people of Chicago of the opportunity of supplying their tables with fresh eggs, while also fixing the prices which they must pay for the old ones, is it not high time that the people do a little regulating of the trusts?—Commercial Poultry.

Mayor Brand Whitlock in an article for the World, discusses the problem of graft in our cities, and reaches the following conclusion: "The only way to eliminate graft is to eliminate the father of graft, which is privilege. And privilege in its most obvious form is the franchise-buying, public-service corporations of the large city. These immense monopolies with monstrous fortunes bound to them must be removed before graft can altogether disappear. These stupendous temptations must be done away with, and this can be done only by the city itself, what it too long neglected to do, namely, conducting its own public utilities itself. That will be the beginning of the elimination of graft."
