On account of the long spell of dry weather, F. S. Whitehouse has been unable to get several rafts of logs from Sutton creek, and in consequence the Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Co.'s saw mill in this city will close down for two weeks as soon as present orders are filled. The mill has been running steady since it was started, making considerable of a pay roll in this city, as well as bringing other business here. As all the business men are benefited in some way or other by the saw mill company, the closing down of the mill will be felt also in a business way, for it will mean several thousand dollars less put into circulation every month.

The Tillamook Electric Light and Fuel Co. is making arrangements to extend its line to Bay City as soon as it can obtain franchises from the county court and Bay City, which will also give electric light service to anyone desiring it between the two towns. The electric light com-

pany is reaching out for business and as it expects to see a large number of acre tracts built upon north of this city and on the Bay City road in the near future, they feel justified in making the extension to Bay City as soon as possible, and probably to Nehalem later. This will give a number of residents modern conveniences, and shows that the electric light company has a great deal of confidence in the growth and development of Tillamook county.

The opening of the Oregon State Fair, September 12, 1910, will usher in what promises to be the greatest, from every standpoint, agricultural and livestock exhibition ever held in the state. As entries for the different exhibits are under way Secretary Frank Meredith is now turning his attention to his ground working forces and having the exhibits, stock barns, race-horse stables and grounds put in holiday attire for the reception of the visitors September 12 to 17 inclusive. New decorations are being placed in the exhibit halls, painters are spreading fresh paint and the entire grounds are being cleaned up so the visitor can enter every nook and corner and find that his coming has been prepared for.

F. H. Graves, representing the Oregonian, was in the county in the interest of the annual edition of that newspaper, which next year will be of unusual interest on account of the 50th anniversary of the installation of the Daily Oregonian. It will be in all respects a notable number, covering the historical, industrial, political and social sense, all the varied interests of Oregon.
