County Judge H. F. Goodspeed eceived this letter from Dr. H. F. Clements, superintendent of the Oregon State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, which is situated five miles south east of Salem:

DEAR SIR, - This will advise you that the Oregon State Tuberculosis Sanatorium will be opened for the reception of patients during the first week in Sep-tember, 1910, with a total pre-sent capacity of fifty beds. In the fact that there will probably be a demand far in excess of this accommodation it is request ed that in so far as possible, thepatients recommended to us be those for whom the greatest amount of good for all concerned can be done, and that only such patients as can be benefitted by a course of treatment be sent us. In so far as practicable the beds will be apportioned to the various counties, proportionate to their population, but beds will not be kept vacant nduce Sheriff Crenshaw to run avail themselves of the privilege of recommending patients. It is therefore desirable that application

> It will be noticed from the accompanying circular of information that applicants must be appropriately supplied with clothing and also that all transportation charges be provided to and from the San-atorium. This must include the cab or ambulance charge from Salem to the Sanatorium. For pa-tients able to ride in a buggy the distance of 6 miles, the charge made by the Salem liverymen will be two dollars and fifty cents.
