Death of M. Shearer.

Marion Shearer died in this city on Saturday night at the home of Attorney I. H. Goynes. He came to this city about two weeks ago with a sore finger, a rusty nail having run into it a week previous. Blood poisoning set in, and his finger was amputated and last Thursday it was found necessary to amputate the arm, as gangrene had set in. This did not save his life, for he lived until Saturday night. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. O. V. Hoven, in the Christian Church on Monday.

M. F. Shearer was born Feb. 28, 1853, in Page County, Iowa, and departed from this life Aug. 27, 1910, at the age of 57 years and 6 months. He crossed the plains with an ox team to Yamhill County, this state, where he stayed one year, when he removed to Washington County, where he resided till 1878, after that he lived in Gold Hill, Wash., for a short time. He came to Tillamook in 1884.

He was married in 1883 to Sarah F. Latimer, and to this union were born four children, three sons and one daughter. He is survived by his wife, two sons and the daughter, the eldest son having died in infancy. Besides he leaves three brothers and one sister. Religiously he held the Baptist faith, though he had never affiliated with any church.
