At a meeting of the City Council on Tuesday evening, two franchisees, one submitted by Frank Elliott and the other by the Business Men's Protective Association in regard to the storage of gasoline, were continued. As the Committee revising the City Charter did not report, the Council adjourned until Friday evening to take up that matter.

Mrs. Zimmerman with her family, will leave on the next steamer to make her home with relatives in California. She was deserted and left destitute by her husband, G. F. Zimmerman, who came to this city a few years ago as the pastor of the Christian Church, and who turned out to be crooked in many ways, and if reports are correct he is wanted by the Sheriff.

A board of Government Engineers, composed of Colonel Biddle and Major Kutz and Major Morrow, will come to Tillamook to confer with the local Ports in regard to bar, bay and slough improvements, and to decide on plans to have this work undertaken with local and government aid. The board will come to this city as soon as some of the engineers are through with other official business.

On Sunday, at 12.25 p.m., a meteor passed over Tillamook which a number of persons witnessed as it made its rush through the air. There was a hissing sound followed by a loud explosion. A number of persons thought that a heavy blast had been set off by the man clearing the land on F. E. Norton's place north of the slough, but soon after it was ascertained by those who had witnessed it that it was a meteor which had caused the commotion. Whether the meteor, which went in a westerly direction, hit in the Pacific ocean or not will probably never be known.

The case against Ennis McIntosh, who was arrested and charged with giving Earl Gilmore, a minor, whiskey, was given a preliminary hearing in Justice Stanley's court on Friday. The case came to an abrupt termination, and it rilled Deputy District Attorney G. Willett when young Gilmore went on the stand and swore that McIntosh did not give him whiskey, which he had sworn to in the complaint. During the trial, it was proved that W. J. Gilmore, father of the complaining witness, had given intoxicating liquor to another son, who is under age. The justice and the prosecuting attorney are firmly of the opinion that young Gilmore had been fixed either in making the complaint or before he went on the witness stand.
