ANCIENT YUCATAN.

Its Mysterious Ruins Once the Scene of Human Sacrifices.

It was Chichen -Chichen Irza the magnificent, the Taj Mahai of Central America-and the building we were gazing on was the most wonderful of the ruined group. As we looked upon it in the moon-

light we could not help feeling how awe inspiring this colossal temple. rearing itself 120 feet into the air, must have been to the ancients. On the top by a stairway on each side of its four sides, having 120 steps apiece, and contains three rooms, the doorposts of which are carved with the figures of priests, except the one facing eastward, which has large pillars carved into the forms of serpents. The heads eye sockets still bearing traces of the

As we sat we pictured to ourselves the strange and barbaric scenes that had here been enacted, for if legends are to be believed it was on these flattened serpents' heads that the tyrant priests of the Itzas, majestic to their beleweled and befeathered robes, tore out the pulpitating hearts of their sacrificial victims after slicing open the breasts with a silex kuife.

These sacrifices were probably performed in view of thousands of worshipers of the sun delty congregated on the plains below, the heart after it was torn from the membranes being burned as an offering in the inner holy of hoties, while the body of the victim rolled down the stone steps to be sucramentally eaten by the people.-World Wide Magazine.
