**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Already, with but the first sprinkle of rain, the streets in the business portion of the city have mired up considerably. What will they be like in a few months more?

What a lot of fuss and bother people do go to to secure public positions for a few men. The people or those who give employment to a large number of men don't act so crazy in selecting their help.

The sanitary conditions of the city, especially in the business portion, might be better than it is. Surely there ought to be enough civic pride to clean up the back premises of garbage and the gutters of filth.

Henry Knaze has announced himself as a candidate for joint representative for Yamhill and Tillamook counties. His card, which catches the public clamor, says he is for Statement No. 1 and against boss rule. But he fails to let the people know if he is riding in the band wagon of the G.O.P., is twining the tail of the Democratic mule, is mounted on the Prohibitionists water wagon, or is waving the red flag of Socialism. Which, Henry?

From all quarters come the announcement, no matter which side candidates were lined up with in the primary election, Republicans are going to support the candidates nominated by that party. Harmony is now the word, with the object of electing the entire ticket. Of course, the Democrats will try to split up the Republican party and divide the vote, for that is their only hope of success. With the Republicans satisfied with nominations made at the primary election, the indications are they will come out on top next month.

Probably a great many of our readers will have noticed that quite a few persons who aspire to public office commence talking about graft, political bosses, etc., for the purpose, no doubt, of getting votes and reflecting upon the honesty and integrity of their opponents. We have all seen and heard that kind of political clap trap in the recent primary election and there will be the same tactics used by others in the coming election by a whole lot of self-righteous office seekers. Watch 'em talk about ring rule, bosses, etc., for no other purpose than an effort to get into the other fellow's shoes.

There is one thing which the proposed city charter is lack in. It should require a residence of three months in the city and a registration before a person is allowed to vote. It is a well known fact that at most every city election a large number of persons—the floating population—have been railroaded to the polls and told to vote in one ward for the purpose of defeating certain candidates. The last city election was a disgrace in that respect, and now is the time to put some safeguards in the proposed charter which will prevent the taxpayers and bona fide residents in this city being outvoted by the transients who haven't a dollar's worth of interest in the city.

On the one hand the liquor interests are endeavoring to induce the people to vote for a pernicious measure which is to give incorporated cities the entire control of the liquor question. If the bill should become law there will be a gay old time in some of the cities of Oregon which are badly governed. On the other hand, the Prohibitionists are endeavoring to force state wide prohibition on the people. Here we have two extreme measures. We do not for one moment think that a very large proportion of the people are ready to go to either extremes, although we are inclined to think, with the saloon element and a large number of the floating population lined up on election day, is liable to poll a big vote for the home rule bill. It is reasonable to suppose that the rural districts will vote solid against the home rule bill of the liquor interests because they are well informed that the cities will have all to say about

the liquor laws and receive the revenue, while those living in rural districts will have no voice in the matter and will have to bear their share of the taxes resulting from the crime caused by the saloons in cities. With the liquor interests taking an active part in politics with the object of controlling cities, if possible, this have done much to stimulate and revive the local option sentiment and will induce a number of people to vote for prohibition because, as have been repeatedly shown, they are opposed to the manner in which saloons have been run. Take Tillamook county for an example. A few months ago it was freely predicted that the county would go "wet" by a large majority. Public sentiment have undergone a wonderful change since then, and the same persons predict quite a different result. The fact of the matter is, on account of the activity the liquor interests are again taken in politics it is arousing the people to take note of what it is up to. As to state wide prohibition, with so few registering as Prohibitionists, we cannot see how that party can hope to carry the state in November, which, as we look at the situation, shows that the state is not ready for state wide prohibition. However, a battle royal is on with these extreme forces, and it is up to the people to decide in favor of the one or the other or against both.

**Bowerman Makes Statement.**

In reply to charges that he is unfriendly to the Direct Primary law and other measures written upon the statute books by the people under the Initiative, Acting Governor Bowerman made the following statement:

"In the Portland evening papers of Sept. 30th there appeared an interview credited to Senator Bourne, in which he endeavors to deceive the people into the belief that I am a reactionary and am not in favor of progressive legislation and favor returning to the old system of electing United States Senators.

"In answer to this communication and other false and misleading articles recently published, I wish to say: Statement No. 1 is a part of the Direct Primary law, and I have heretofore publicly stated, and now state again, that I will oppose by every means within my power, any effort to amend, modify or repeal, or in any other manner render less useful or less satisfactory, any part of the direct primary law, including Statement No. 1, or any other law written on the statute books by the people of this state, under the initiative and referendum.

"As a member of the Senate and President of that body, I have never endeavored in any way or form to induce any other member to violate his obligation or pledge under Statement No. 1, and if I am elected Governor I shall pursue the same course and shall not in any manner or by any means interfere with the conduct of any member in this particular or induce him to violate his pledge.

"I do not anticipate that Senator Bourne has any fear whatever that Statement No. 1 will be repealed or changed, or that I will violate any of the moral or legal obligations I would owe to the people as Governor of this state; but I do believe he is simply indulging in a few cheap heroics for the two-fold purpose: First, of endeavoring to induce the people to forget his own shortcomings in the recent past as Senator; and, Second, in the further hope that he may create a false issue under which he might be returned to this high office. He evidently feels that he will need the office of Governor to assist him in his primary campaign two years hence, and perhaps has many doubts as to his ability to coerce, or otherwise induce me to favor him over other candidates in that primary nomination."
