Astrup, regained command of the vessel Tuesday previous to her departure from Portland for Tillamook. Captain Astrup was on the steamer Alliance before she was ordered out of commission and remained on the craft for several months, resigning to go on the Golden Gate.

Wm. Illingworth came near meeting with a fatal accident on Wednesday while blasting on the Goodspeed place. A ten stick blast had failed to go off and Illingworth was standing over it with the intention of setting it off again, when it suddenly exploded, throwing him thirty feet and he landed on his shoulder. He was brought to town and Dr. Kerron attended to his injuries. His face was powder burned, and with the exception of a sore shoulder he was not otherwise hurt, besides the shock it gave him.

A public meeting of the business men of the city was held at the Tillamook Commercial Club on Wednesday evening, when there was a good attendance of the leading citizens. The object of the meeting was to amend some of the provisions of the proposed city charter, when a number of changes were suggested, such as making the bonded indebtedness \$200,000, requiring a residence of three months before a person can vote, payment of extension of water mains to be paid by abutting property, a clause to license, control or prohibit the sale of liquor, etc. There was a difference of opinion as to giving the mayor so much power, some of the business men contending that the commissions should be elected instead of appointed. The matter of doing away with seats, games, screens, etc., in saloons was voted down as these matters would be under the control of the licensing commission. The matter of allowing saloon keep-

ers to violate the law four times before they could be deprived of a license was objected to, and to allowing saloons to remain open until one o'clock.

FREE RURAL DELIVERY.

Congressman Hawley is the Man Who Obtained it for Tillamook.

Have just been advised by Postmaster General that he has given instructions for the establishment of rural free delivery from Tillamook without further delaying, as I requested.

This is the rural route which was gone over by the inspector some months ago, and takes in South Prairie, Long Prairie, Fairview and the Willa river, a distance of over 20 miles, with comparatively little back tracking.

The Postoffice Department has been holding up rural extensions all over the country, but the Postmaster-General says he is allowing the Tillamook extension to slip through as the result of the personal appeal made by Mr. Hawley.

MEMORIES OF MARK TWAIN.

Two Letters the Humorist Wrote to Henry Watterson.

"Mark Twain—An Intimate Memory." is the title of Henry Watterson's article about his cousin as it appears in the American Magazine. Mr. Watterson recalls the following incident as being typical of Mark Twain's whimsical point of view:

"His mind turned ever to the droll. Once in London I was living with my family at 103 Mount street. Between 103 and 102 there was the parochial workhouse—quite a long and imposing building. One evening, upon coming in from an outing, I found a letter he had written on the sitting room table and left with his card. He spoke of the 'shock he had received upon finding that next to 102—presumably 103—was the workhouse. He had loved me, but had always feared that I would end by disgracing the family—being hanged, or something—but the 'work' that was beyond him: he had not thought it would come to that. And so on through pages of horseplay, his relief on ascertaining the truth and learning his mistake, his regret at not finding me at home, closing with a dinner invitation. Once at Geneva, in Switzerland, I received a long, overflowing letter, full of buoyant oddities, written from London. Two or three hours later came a telegram: 'Burn letter. Blot it from your memory. Susie is dead.'"
Susie was Mrs. Clemens.

TURKISH WOMEN.

They Are Curiously Fastidious in Some of Their Ways.

The habits of the Turkish women of Constantinople are wonderfully fastidious. For instance, when they wash their hands at a tap from which water runs into a marble basin the fair ones will let the water run until a servant shuts it off, inasmuch as to do this themselves would render them "unclean." They cannot open or shut a door, as the handle would be unclean. One of these fastidious women was not long ago talking to a small niece who had just received a present of a doll from Paris. By and by the child laid the doll in the lady's lap. She was horrified and ordered the child to take it away. As the little girl would not move it and no servant was near and the lady would be defiled by touching a doll that had been brought from abroad, the only resource left her was to jump up and let the doll fall. It broke in pieces.
