Commissioners' Court.

The Commissioners' Court met in regular session Wednesday, November the 2nd, and did the following business, with County Judge H. F. Goodspeed and Commissioners H. V. Alley and G. W. Bodyfelt present.

The claim of Beall & Co for \$270.75 for supplies for road Dist. No. 1 was ordered continued.

Upon the acceptance of the resignation of W. S. Randall as Road Supervisor of Dist. No. 3 Cyrus Randall was appointed to fill that vacancy.

In the matter of the petition of George Loerpabel and others to have a county road built from the West Bank of the Nehalem where the present bridge crosses said river to the Northernly corner of Block One in the town of Wheeler, the court authorized O. H. Schrader, Fred Zaddach and F. M. Wakeley as viewers of said road.

In the matter of the support of Francis Xavier Moreau, the Judge was authorized to secure a deed of his place and pay off mortgages on said place. The court was also authorized to pay out the sum of \$200.00 for his benefit.

In the matter of the petition of the Oregon and California R.R. Co. for cancellation of taxes, the County Clerk was authorized by the Court to cancel said taxes and delinquencies.

In the matter of advertising for bids on what is known as the Rock Road, running from Oretown School House to the Commons' place, the County Clerk was ordered to advertise same.

Revival Meetings Close.

Sunday evening the great revival at the big tent came to a close amid stirring and dramatic scenes. At the close of the sermon in the evening, responding to the appeal of Evangelist Olson eight strong men and women came down the aisle during the singing of the invitation hymn. Then the evangelist requested that the singing cease, and while the audience stood with bowed heads while he continued pleading for men and women to surrender themselves to Christ. Tears were in the eyes of many while one after another men and women came forward until a total of seventeen had stepped out for Christ at that one service. Twenty one were added during that day.

From every point of view this is the greatest revival ever held in Tillamook. The attendance and interest has been the largest, the preaching and singing have been the best, the results have been the greatest, and the influence the farthest reaching of any revival ever held here. Sunday was a great day at the big tent. The program began with a big Bible School Rally at 10:00 at which the attendance reached over 125. At the 11:00 o'clock service Mr. Olson preached on "Heaven," one of the finest sermons he has yet delivered. In keeping with this subject The Moss Family sang a trio "Bright Land" and Mr. Moss sang "The Holy City" with great power.

The Basket dinner at 12:30 was another most enjoyable occasion. Over 100 partook of the bounties provided by the women and friends of the church. At 3:00 Mr. Olson gave his great lecture on "America Past, Present and Future," in which he pointed out clearly that the Pacific Ocean and the Western coast of the U. S. will soon become the commercial center of the world.

At 6:30 the Christian Endeavor Society which was organized on Friday evening held its first regular meeting. The society now has 63 active members and eight associate members. This membership makes it one of the large societies of the state. The following are the officers: Pres., Mrs. Irwin Harrison, Vice Pres. Helen Beals, Secretary Benton Stanley, Treasurer Arthur Wallace, Chorister A. F. Schofield, Leader of Orchestra Chester McGhee, Organist Faye Todd. The young people had a remarkably fine meeting Sunday evening, over twenty taking an active part.

At 7:30 Mr. Olson gave the final sermon of the revival, preaching on "Why I Believe the Bible To Be the Word of God." At this service Mr. Moss sang by request three splendid solos, "Christ Is King," "My Heavenly Father Watches Over Me," and "There Will Be No Tears in Paradise." All were sung in a masterly way.

Up to date there have been 131 additions, 103 by confession and 28 by letter or statement. This week, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, Mr. Olson gave his three pay lectures. This evening a reception will be held at the tent to all who have come in during the meeting. Everybody is invited to this service and it will be one of the most enjoyable occasions of the whole revival.

The evangelists will remain in Tillamook until next Monday, and will hold services at Bay City Friday night and at the big tent next Sunday.

The Sunday sermons will be 11:00 o'clock, "After the Revival, then what;" 3:00 o'clock, "How going to Heaven is Like Riding a Bicycle;" 7:30. Mr. Moss and family will have special music for all these services. Everybody invited. At the conclusion of the evening sermon a farewell service to the evangelists will be held.

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
