Editorial Snap Shots.

The "wets" will have reason to be truly thankful and happy this Thanksgiving.

Of course there is going to be less business and more book accounts for business men when the "wet" regime comes into effect again.

Tillamook City is to be visited by another party of evangelists. It seems to us that this city is getting its full share of sensational religion.

Teddy Roosevelt says he was beaten to a "frazzle" in New York. The prohibitionists in Oregon must admit that they, too, were beaten to a "frazzle."

It is up to those who defeated the proposed new city charter to furnish something better, as the city needs a charter that is in keeping with its growth and development.

It seems to us, if the vote for governor is any criterion to go by, that a whole raft of persons in this county voted for a renewal of Democratic hard times. Well, they are liable to get a dose of it.

"Beaten to a Frazzle!" to quote Roosevelt's admission. That is what a large number of Republicans attempted to do to the Republican party in Oregon when they "knifed" Republican candidates.

What consistency. Some Republicans would not vote for Bowerman because he was endorsed by any assembly, but they voted for other candidates who received their nomination in the same way.

We are informed that the grafters still find business men, as well as the dairymen, "easy" in this city and county. They "bit" readily at most every fakir's scheme, who make easy money without doing a lick of work.

A large number of Republicans went into a Republican primary election and nominated a ticket, and in the election knifed the head of the ticket. Wonder how they would feel if their name was at the head of the ticket and was knifed by Republicans?

Bro. Effenberger, of the Nehalem Enterprise, was in the city this week in attendance at the K.P.'s doings. It was not surprising for him to steer clear of the city marshal, for the snap shot man vouched for his usual good behavior while visiting in the metropolis of this county. Come again, Bro., you're quite welcome.

A large number of copies of the Oregon Free Press were sent to people in this county during the election, and the manner in which they were strewn on the floor of the post office by the persons whom they were sent to, plainly indicate that the people did not propose to read prohibition literature entrusted upon them in that manner.

The "wets" have been industriously busy for over five years pointing out some bad features of local option and closing their eyes to the good features. In a few weeks the tables will be turned and the "wets" will be on trial and criticised for what devilment and drunkenness originates in the saloons. So the merry war will be waged for many years to come.

"Regulate the saloons!" was the argument used by the wets in the recent political fight. We, too, say regulate the saloon. It is a most difficult thing to do, however, but it is generally supposed that Tillamook City will start in to regulate the saloons by issuing saloon licenses to well known gamblers and blind pigs. Does the "wets" think that this will be a good start to reform the saloons in this city?

The Prohibitionists, in forcing state wide prohibition into the political fight, met, as we predicted, a crushing defeat, for the people of Oregon are not disposed to make such a radical change. Too much time and ammunition was expended on

state wide prohibition and too little on local option, with the result that Tillamook county is again in the "wet" column, as well as seven other "dry" counties.

Something should be done to prohibit saloon keepers from manufacturing and dispensing doctored whiskey, which was doled out over the bar of some of the saloons in years past. Because a saloon keeper pays a big license he should not be permitted to sell adulterated or saloon manufactured whiskey—the same remarks apply to other adulterated and short weight articles sold in this city. A little investigation once in a while would put a stop to rot gut whiskey and adulterated and short weight articles being sold.

The best joke of the election is on J. C. Bewley, a rabid prohibitionist, who made a mistake and voted to make the county "wet" and for the liquor dealers' home rule bill. As Bro. Bewley paraded the town on horses back, carrying a broom with the Stars and Stripes attached, when the saloons were put out of business five years ago, it wouldn't be a bad idea if he would perform a similar service for the "wets." Well, well, well. No one would have dreamed that a prohibitionist, with so radical ideas, would vote against what he has been preaching so many years.

It was a well merited honor that the people conferred upon Judge Geo. H. Burnett when they elected him one of the Supreme Judges of Oregon. No one was more deserving of the honor than Judge Burnett, for the people knew his sterling qualities as a jurist, and the dispatch and decorum which characterized his court. He may not have been very popular with bulldoze and pettifogging attorneys, for they knew full well that any levity on their part soon brought down the stern rebuke of the court. In behalf of our constituents we extend congratulations to Judge Burnett for the implicit confidence the people have in him and his elevation to the Supreme Court.

The November elections show that the people want to pull down the Republican party, which brought about a long spell of prosperity. One thing we want to impress upon those who voted for a Democratic governor last week, don't be surprised, if the country goes Democratic two years hence, if values in Tillamook lands are reduced one half. Yet one thing further, don't be caught with a lot of high priced land with a big mortgage plaster when the country goes Democratic. But the people appear to want a change by the way they have been voting, little dreaming, perhaps, that by doing so it is liable to knock the props from under the present prosperous conditions.

It was good judgment on the part of Captain Hosford, managing owner of the Golden Gate which probably saved that vessel from a serious disaster. It was the intention to take out 30 large hogs on the vessel last week, but Capt. Hosford being suspicious about the weather at this season of the year, phoned in from Portland not to ship the hogs. And it was fortunate that he did, for a furious storm came up after the Golden Gate and Sue H. Elmore crossed out, and each vessel was severely lashed with the heavy sea all that day and night and until noon the next day. What would have happened to the Golden Gate had the hogs been on board and piled up on one side when struck by a heavy sea can only be surmised, but we think that the wise precautions taken by Captain Hosford, prevented, probably, a serious disaster. It is safe to predict that shipment of hogs by steamer will be discontinued, for Captain Hosford is too much of an experienced steamboat man to run any risks like that.

It rests entirely with the city and county officials whether Tillamook County will remain "wet" or go "dry" in another twelve months. It is up to them to prevent saloons from becoming hells of drunkenness and gambling dives. Will they have the grit and backbone to frame such ordinances which will put proper restrictions on saloon keepers? The Headlight's fight against saloons in this city was the shameful and rotten manner in which the city offi-

cial allowed them to run. The officials, as well as the saloon keepers, are to be given another trial, and if something can be done to wipe out the bad reputation the city and county have fallen heir to on account of those who have been dispensing liquor, it will be a proper movement. If not, and the saloons are allowed to become gambling joints again, then the Headlight will make another aggressive fight to put them out of business next year, which will not be a very difficult matter to do if the officials allow saloons to run in such a manner to disgust the people. That will be the attitude of the snap shot man, for he will have no fight with saloon keepers who want to act decent in conducting a nasty business.

Still the "suckers" bite, and bite readily. This county and city have had their usual round of "salesmen," disposing of stock, stoves and other fine investments. They report that business is good in Tillamook, as it always is for smooth, persuasive talkers, who make big money without work, even if they have to take money away from people who are standing off the grocer and people who are in debt, yet they seem to be able to make it work, though it seems hard to believe that people are so easily "worked" and "frazzled" out of their hard earned cash. The snap shot man has pounded on this matter for a long time and is going to keep pounding, even if it does seem to be a hopeless, thankless task. The Merchants' Protective Association of the Tillamook Commercial Club was reported to be going to take some action on this question, but the continuous round of stock and bargain seller keeps rolling on and all leave with the satisfaction of taking away considerable money, and with a smile, after selling a pig in a poke to Tillamookers. If one of our own citizens would try to sell some of the stuff that have found ready takers in this city and county, he would be promptly and correctly called insane, but just let one of those smooth talking, bulldozing traveling fellows drop in here, he can actually do business with people who are standing off the grocer and butcher. If as much money, in proportion to the population should be taken out of Portland as is taken out of Tillamook in this manner the figures would be staggering, and the funny thing is that in 19 cases out of 20 if these people who seem to want to buy so badly would shut their eyes and go out and buy Tillamook real estate or go to the local merchants, they would be a great deal better off and help sustain the prosperity of the county and city. Talk about the need of new enterprises, we need something to give our citizens brains and backbone to stand off these grafters and gold-brick fellows.

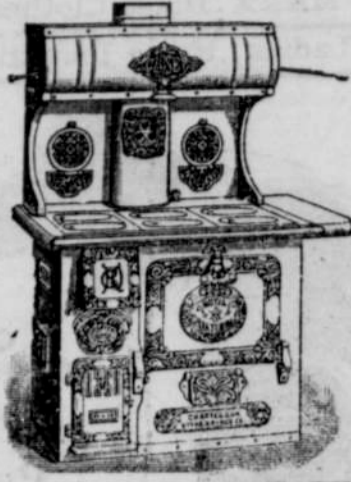
