Commissioner Alley is down from Nehalem attending court this week, with the usual pleasant smile on his countenance, notwithstanding a petition is being circulated for his recall, which contains false and heinous accusations. Mr. Alley will have his recourse in damage suits against those who have circulated and signed the petition, and it is for that reason, probably, that so many persons have felt so uneasy and have gone to County Clerk Holden to have their names erased, and who want to sign a protest against calling a special election. It may save some people a lot of trouble and litigation and expense, who have innocently signed it, before it becomes a public document to take a like course, for, from what we can learn, Mr. Alley's friends are ready to go on the warpath and back him in fighting this unjust, wrong and ill-advised petition to recall him, at \$500 expense to the taxpayers for personal reasons.

At a meeting of the city council on Monday evening, the question of better lights for the city was again discussed and final action taken in the matter. An ordinance was passed whereby the Electric Light & Fuel Co. is to be reimbursed to the extent of \$20 for changing the present arc system, which has given unsatisfactory service, the city agreeing to take sixty small lights, to cost \$2.00 per light per month. With this number of lights distributed over the city the residence portion will be better provided with street lights. The applications for saloon licenses were continued.
