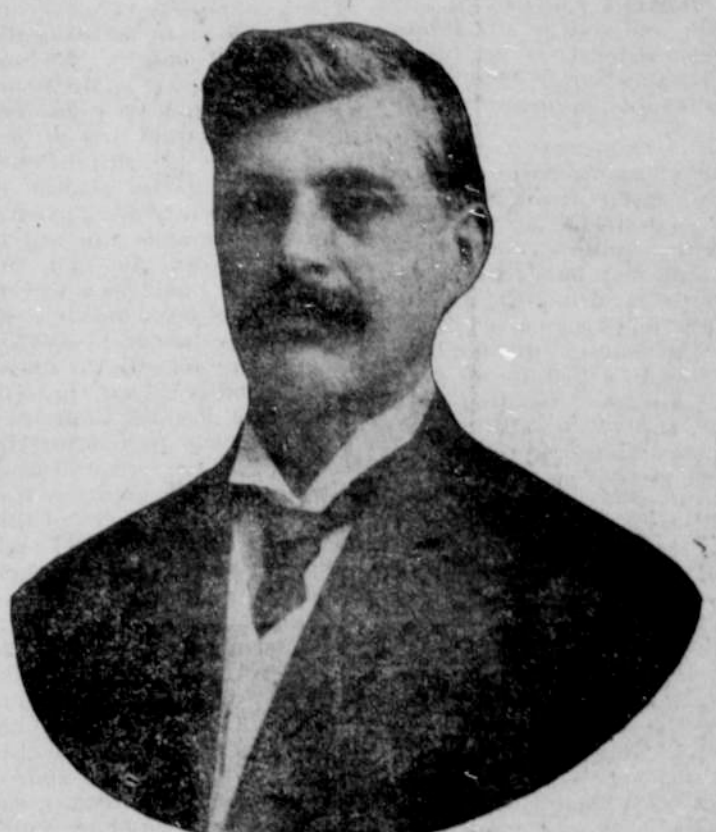

 Washington, D.C., Dec. 9, 1910. Fred C. Baker, Tillamook, Ore.
 River and harbor bill just passed the house, carrying \$5,000 for Tillamook for next fiscal year. Report on recent survey for new project not yet received, but am urging early action.

 We are also informed that Mr. Hawley took the initial step to have Nehalem bar surveyed, which was also included in the bill.
 What is known as the Elmore farm was sold last week by Fred R. Beals to John Hathaway for \$56,000. Three years ago Mr. Beals paid Samuel Elmore \$16,000 for the place, and the Headlight at the time predicted that in a few years he would sell it for \$50,000, but it sold for \$6,000 more than that amount. The stock is included in the purchase price. Mr. Beals improved the place while he held it, expending a large amount of money doing so.
