

**Commissioners' Court.**

Claim of F. C. Skomp for \$216.34 was rejected.

Claim of road report R. D. No. 6 for \$21.24 was rejected.

In the matter of the contract with Lee Tittle for making a fill near the Maxwell place, the county agreed to pay 25c. per cubic yard.

In the matter of the petition of George Loerpabel and others for a county road, it was ordered that the road be opened.

In the matter of the incorporation of Bay City on the petition of W. S. Cone, it was ordered that the petition be dismissed.

The bonds of David Martiny as county treasurer, Henry Crenshaw as sheriff, and J. C. Holden as county clerk, were accepted.

A contract was entered into with the Electric Light Co. to furnish lights for the Court House for \$8.55 per month.

In the matter of dividing the county into road districts, it was ordered by the court that the county be divided into three districts, to wit:

No. 1—Beginning at the N E cor sec 1, tp 3 N, R 6 W, thence W along the N boundary of the county, to the S W cor of lot 4, sec 30, tp 1 N, R 10 W, thence E to the S E cor of sec 27, tp 1 N, R 6 W, thence northerly along E boundary.

No. 2—Beginning at the N E cor of Sec 33, tp 1 N, R 6 W to the S W cor of lot 4, sec 30, tp 1 N, R 10 W, thence S along the west boundary to the S. line of tp 2 S, R 11 W; thence E. along to the S. line of tp 2 S, R 11 W, and 2 S 10, 2 S 9, 2 S 8, 2 S 7, 2 S 6, to the S E cor sec 31, tp 2 S, R 6 W, thence northerly along the E boundary to the place of beginning.

No. 3—Beginning at the N E cor of sec 6, tp 3 S, R 6 W, thence W along the N line of tp 3 S, R 6, 3 S 7, 3 S 8, 3 S 9, 3 S 10 and 3 S 11, to the Pacific Ocean, thence in a southerly direction along the W boundary to the sec line on the S side of sec 14, tp 6 S, R 11 W, thence E on S boundary line to S E cor of sec 13, tp 6 S, R 9 W, thence N 2 1/2 miles, to Yamhill county line, thence W 3 miles to W line of sec 3, tp 6 S, R 9 W, thence N to N E cor sec 21, thence to tp 4 S, R 9 W, thence E to S E cor sec 18, tp 4 S, R 6 W, thence N to place of beginning.

In the matter of a levy for the 1910 assessment roll, the court found that it will require \$306,532.49 to defray the expenses of the county for the year 1910.
