A suit has been filed in the circuit court by Alex Watt against Frank Long, Sr., and Catherine Long, in which the plaintiff sues for \$492.12 growing out of a contract for logs from the plaintiff's property. The plaintiff further prays for a decree foreclosing the mortgage and also a decree foreclosing all of the defendant's right, title and interest in and to the timber and other rights given to the defendant, and that defendant be restrained from selling or disposing in any manner any of the timber or logs.

The G. W. Taylor Co., consisting of himself as Evangelist, L. A. Wegner musical director, Mrs. Carrie B. Taylor, as Cornet soloist and personal worker, and Paul Taylor as boy soloist, left on the Golden Gate Sunday. They were very successful in their meetings here. BAR IMPROVEMENTS.

Amendment to Rivers and Harbors Bill Introduced by Senator Bourne.

The Port of Tillamook having waived all rights to appeal from the Board of Engineers' recommendations in regard to harbor improvements at Tillamook, Senator Bourne introduced the necessary amendment to be incorporated in the pending rivers and harbors bill, copies of which reached this city on Tuesday, which is as follows:

AMENDMENT

Introduced to be proposed by Mr. Bourne to the bill (H. R. 28632) making appropriations for the construction, repair, and preservation of certain public works on rivers and harbors, and for other purposes, viz.: After line 9, page 33, insert the following: Improving Tillamook Bay and Bar, Oregon.

For improvement of Tillamook Bar and Bay, in accordance with the plan submitted in House Document numbered —, Sixty-first Congress, third session, three hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That no part of said sum shall be expended by the Secretary of War until he shall be satisfied, by deposit or otherwise, that local interests will place to the credit of the Secretary of War, in some duly authorized United States depository to be designated by him, a sum equal to one-fourth of the total cost of said improvement, to be expended by said Secretary of War, together with the amount herein appropriated, in the execution of the plan of improvement recommended in the report referred to.
