Alley, Fred Zaddach, Peter Heisel, C. Ray and R. Y. Blalock were appointed a committee to make arrangements. F. R. Beals stated that Representative A. G. Beals was making an effort to get an appropriation from the state legislative for \$800 towards the fair. Chas. Adkins, Wm. Illingsworth and John W. Adkins, the latter being recently from Montana, had quite an exciting time on the Wilson river on Friday with a cougar, or mountain lion. The animal set them a merry chase which lasted for three hours, but the plucky hunters kept on its trail. It was a hard chase over rough ground and through the thick timber. The last attempt to avoid the vigilance of the hunters was when the cougar crossed the river and was closely followed by the dogs. It sought safety in a tree, when it was soon shot. It measured 10 feet and weighed 250 pounds. It will be very difficult for the people of Tillamook or for anyone else familiar with the situation to understand why the Engineers' Board of Reviews at Washington has disapproved the recommendation of the special board on the Tillamook project. The special board visited Tillamook and found an immense agriculture and timber traffic locked up and valueless until the entrance to the harbor was improved. So anxious were the Tillamook and Bay City people to secure this improvement that they agreed to tax themselves for a sum aggregating more than \$600,000—a sum that would have been highly creditable to communities of ten times the wealth and population. If ever there was a meritorious proposition in which the people of a community expressed their faith in good hard cash it was the Tillamook improvement project, and it is a narrow, short-sighted policy that has robbed them of the appropriation and retarded the growth of the region.—Oregonian.

NEW BOAT ORDERED.

Gasoline Schooner to Operate in Coast Trade.

Development of the Oregon coast trade, which has been marked during the past year, has prepared the way for further tonnage to handle the ocean traffic and Elmore & Co., of Astoria, announced the awarding of a contract to Kruse & Co., of North Bend, for the construction of a gasoline schooner that will have a speed of 11 knots, and will be ready for service May 1. She will operate between Portland, Tillamook and Yaquina Bay points. The schooner will be of the twin screw type and equipped with two powerful gasoline engines.

The new vessel will be larger than the gasoline schooner Anvil which sailed from Portland last week on her initial voyage to coast ports. She will be 125 feet long and have a beam of 28 feet and 9 feet depth of hold. The Anvil is 116 feet long and has a 24-foot beam and 16.5 feet depth of hold, being equipped with twin screws and capable of considerable speed. The Elmore interests also own the steamer Sue H. Elmore, which sailed last night for Tillamook, and the gasoline schooner Oshkosh, operating on the coast route. The Elmore is 90.7 feet long, with a beam of 23.8 feet, and her hold is 8 feet deep, while the Oshkosh has a length of 80 feet, is 24 feet wide and her hold 7 feet deep. She was also built by Kruse & Co., and was launched at North Bend in 1900. The Elmore was launched in 1900. I. W. W. Brown representing the Olson & Mahony interests and in charge of Couch street dock, has received an offer of the agency of the new schooner, as he also handles the Elmore's business and it is planned that both shall operate from the same berth.
