 The Tillamook Lumber Manufacturing Company's saw mill, which gave the city a good pay roll for a long time, and which closed down last fall, is getting ready to start up again, the mill having been kept up in good shape. The company has about 1,500,000 feet of logs on hand to start with. Until business picks up the mill will not be run its full capacity. There is some doubt as to the amount of lumber that will be required for the local market this year, but as soon as the mill starts again it is expected that things will commence to move in the building line and make a break in the dull season to one of business activity and push.

Too much praise cannot be given to the members of the Dramatic Club for the manner in which they presented the play "Arizona," as every part of the long cast was rendered in a manner that bespoke of careful study. The minor details were looked after, and no part of the play was omitted. It would not be fair to single out any particular one and say he or she was the best. The difference in the parts must be considered, consequently some were more pleasing than others, but it was a beautiful play well rendered. Mr. McCowell has had a number of requests to repeat the play, for there were a number of people who could not attend on the nights that the play was given, and who are desirous of seeing it. It has not been decided whether the play will be repeated. Such plays have a tendency to advance the moral standard, and more of that character would be a good thing.
Smith Boys in Trouble Again.
 Sheriff Crenshaw went to the Miami river on Tuesday and arrested the Smith boys of that place, who had entered the Miami Lumber Co.'s store at Hobsonville last week, taking a number of hats, shoes and other merchandise. They entered the building through a side window. The sheriff found Louis, jr., and Roy Smith, two of the brothers, and arrested them, and found the stolen goods on the boys. They were given a preliminary hearing before the justice at Bay City on Wednesday, and they were bound over to the grand jury. Their bail were placed at \$1,000 each, and as no one cared to go on their bond, the sheriff brought them to the city and locked them up in the county jail. It will be remembered that Walter and Louis Smith, jr., broke into one of the stores at Garibaldi nearly a year ago, and were sentenced to terms in the county jail, from which they were released a few months since.

THE COUNTY OFFICIALS SALARIES.

The Bill Passed the House--County Court to Regulate Salaries of Deputies.

Representative A. G. Beals introduced a bill to regulate the salaries of county officials in Tillamook County, which also provides for the county court to fix the salaries of deputies. The bill increases the salaries of the county judge to \$1,200 and the treasurer to \$1,000 and \$5.00 per day for the commissioners when transacting business. The salaries of the county clerk, sheriff, assessor and school superintendent remains the same. Following is the bill, which can go to a vote of the people, if so desired:

1. County Judge, \$1,200.
2. County Commissioner, \$5 per day for each day employed in the transaction of county business.
3. County Treasurer, \$1,000.
4. County Clerk, \$1,000.
5. Sheriff, \$1,000.
6. Assessor, \$1,200.
7. The county court of Tillamook County may provide for such county treasurer, county clerk, sheriff and assessor, such deputies and assistants as the court may deem sufficient to properly and effectively transact the business of said office, and such deputies or assistants shall be paid the sum, or sums, of money to be determined by said county court for their services.
8. County School Superintendent, \$1,000.
9. Any and all fees collected for any purpose whatever, by any and all of the county officers herein mentioned, shall be turned into the county treasury.
10. Provided, however, that 25 per cent. of the legal voters of Tillamook County may file with the county clerk of said county, within ninety days after the adjournment of this legislature their referendum petition to refer this act to a vote of the people of said county, and if any such referendum petition be filed as herein provided, the county court of said county shall make an order referring this act to the vote of the people of said county, and the vote thereon shall be had at the next general election in this state, unless said county court deems it proper to call a special election therefore, in which case such special election shall be provided for by said county court duly entered on its journal.
