

PLEA MADE FOR TILLAMOOK.

Army Board Informed of Timber Awaiting Port Improvement.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6.—Senator Bourne and Russell Hawkins, representing the Whitley Timber Company, to-day appeared before the Army board of review in behalf of Tillamook harbor improvements.

Bourne offered statistics to show that the construction of this project would place on the market 20,000,000 feet of timber, which at \$7 per thousand, the cost to manufacture, would distribute \$140,000,000 among those directly interested. The gross value of the lumber would be \$200,000,000. Bourne contended that the development of this latest resource justified the Government in the investment of \$1,200,000 necessary for the project.

Some members of the board indicated their opinion that local interests should co-operate to a larger extent than 25 per cent. Bourne declared that the ports of Tillamook and Bay City had already reached their legal limit of co-operation. Mr. Hawkins announced that his company would donate to the port of Bay City ample grounds on the water front for public docks. This offer is expected to have an important bearing because of the policy of the Government not to aid in harbor improvements where public docks are not available. Early action by the board is expected.

SEAMEN IN CLASH.

Union Men Attack Non-Union on Golden Gate's Deck.

A fight between union and non-union seamen on the deck of the steamship Golden Gate at the foot of Washington street Friday night resulted in victory for the former, but only after Mate Harry Vahlbusch had been struck a savage blow above the eye with a three-cornered scraper and Carl Bartleson, a member of the crew, was lying unconscious on the deck as the result of a blow in the face.

The crew of the Golden Gate quit in a body and the vessel, which was due to sail for Tillamook at 9 o'clock Friday night, is still in port. The union men outnumbered their antagonists about three to one and their showing of serious intention was sufficient to intimidate the non-union seamen.

Bogobon Resists Arrest.

Julius Bogobon, one of the attacking party, was placed under arrest by Patrolman Klingel, after he had struck the officer a savage blow in the face. Bogobon was struck twice and knocked to the ground by Klingel. Bogobon was booked on charges of disorderly conduct and resisting an officer. Captain Bailey fixed his bail at \$200, which he was unable to furnish. The Golden Gate, which is owned by the Portland-Tillamook Transportation Company and which plies between this city and Tillamook, is in port on the return end of the first trip with a non-union crew. The vessel was boarded by a score of union seamen while Captain L. Snyder was away for dinner about 6 o'clock. The men were loading cargo and an argument ensued, when they were told to quit the "scab" ship.

Mate Dies Shot.

Attracted by angry voices and the sound of scuffling, Mate Vahlbusch rushed up from below and fired a shot over the heads of the intruders. The attention of the assaulting party was turned to him. His body was confiscated and the blow with the scraper, which felled him to the deck followed.

About a week ago Captain O. W. Hosford, manager of the Portland-Tillamook Transportation Company, discharged the union crew of the Golden Gate and hired non-union men, declaring that he could not afford to pay the union scale of \$30 a month and overtime at the rate of 55 cents an hour. He contracted to pay the members of the new crew \$55 a month and no overtime.

Captain Snyder says that under the old system of 35 cents an hour overtime, the wages of the men sometimes ran as high as \$80 and \$90 a month. It is necessary to put in a great deal of overtime at both ends of the route, though principally at Tillamook, where, states the captain, the crew often works until midnight.

Bogobon was sent to the rock pile for 30 days.
