NOTICE TO SUBSCRIBERS.

Law to Be Enforced in Oregon by the P.O. Department.

While attending the State Editorial Association at Topeka last week it was learned that the Postoffice Department at Washington meant just what they said when they issued orders that the publishers of weekly newspapers should not send a paper to anyone after the subscription had lapsed for one year. The Department has given publishers plenty of time to get their list in shape and now proposes to enforce the order vigorously. It makes it absolutely imperative, therefore, that all publishers of weekly newspapers must stop their papers when subscribers are delinquent one year, and if they continue to send the paper their right of entry in the mails at the second class rate will be taken away from them--which means that they might as well shut up shop and quit business. This paper proposes to comply strictly with the regulations of the Department and will endeavor each month to notify subscribers whose subscriptions will be one year in arrears during the following month that it will be necessary to have their renewal by that time if they wish the paper continued to their address. If the subscriber cannot or does not care to part with the coin at that time, they may come in and sign a promise to pay at some future time in order to comply with the regulations of the Department. We trust our readers will all understand the situation and do all they can to help us to avoid trouble with the post-office department. This matter will have to be adjusted by 1st of April and those who are delinquent at the end of that time will have to be stricken from the mailing lists.--Pratt County Republican.

Who Opposes Parcels Post?

John Wannamaker, while postmaster general, said that there were five "reasons" against parcels post--"the five express companies." These greedy corporations are yet, and always will be, opposed to parcels post. But there are others--the retail merchants in the small towns who profess to believe that, were parcels post service established, the "mail order" house in the large cities would drive them out of business. This belief is largely inspired by the express companies, yet the latter rob and fleece the retail merchants with as little compunction as they do the humblest citizen.

Be it remembered that when rural free mail delivery was first proposed the retail merchants in the small towns throughout the country raised the same outcry--that such mail service would hurt their business. There was as much logic in that claim as there is in their opposition to parcels post.

CARGO IS GASOLINE.

Golden Gate to Carry Big Load to Supply Towns.

To forestall a famine in gasoline in Tillamook, Bay City and other points on Tillamook Bay, Captain O. W. Hosford, of the Portland-Tillamook Transportation Company, has accepted consignments in large quantities for shipment on the steamer Golden Gate, sailing from here tomorrow afternoon, and because of the presence of explosives aboard, no passengers will be carried. Work was commenced on the Golden Gate, which is on the Oregon dock, yesterday morning, and Captain Hosford says that she will be floated this afternoon and immediately begin taking cargo. She will have considerable cargo in addition to gasoline. Captain Hosford was informed that firms handling gasoline at bay point depended on the schooner Oshkosh delivering the usual supply this week, but as she lies high and dry on the beach as a result of Monday's gale, other arrangements had to be made.

The Elmore interests, owners of the Oshkosh, have decided to entertain proposition for the sale or salvage of the vessel and bids will be opened on Monday. She lies one-quarter of a mile south of the Columbia River jetty, having been stranded above the low water mark, and tenders for the purchase of the hull or engines or both will be considered on their present condition.

Captain Paul Schrader, master of the steamer Sue H. Elmore, which arrived yesterday from Tillamook, says that conditions outside are again normal. He learned that none of the bodies of the Oshkosh's crew had been washed ashore and he thinks that there is only one body on the wreck. Residents of Seaside yesterday found the masts and a portion of the sails and rigging of a small vessel, which drifted into a cove near Tillamook Rock. The wreckage is thought to have been from the Oshkosh. Lines were made fast and an effort will be made to drag it in shore today.--Oregonian.

Sea Yields Oshkosh Dead.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 18.--The bodies of three of the victims of the gasoline schooner Oshkosh disaster, were found today, one at Columbia Beach, one at Gearhart Park and one at Holladay.

The bodies were brought here tonight and were identified as the bodies of William R. Dean, part owner and engineer on the craft, Charles Larson and Gus Chilberg, two of the sailors. The bodies of Captain Latham, master, Al Davis, cook, and Gus Rainbager, a sailor, are still missing.

TILLAMOOK'S HIGH GRADE CHEESE.

F. W. Christensen Is Re-appointed Inspector and Grader.

The annual meeting of the Tillamook County Creamery Association was held on Monday and F. W. Christensen was re-appointed Inspector and Grader, the Association being well pleased with the results attending the inspection of the factories, the uniform cheese manufactured and grading. Following are the reports of the Secretary and Inspector:

To the Stockholders of the Tillamook County Creamery Association, Tillamook, Oregon.

Gentlemen:--Following is my report as secretary of your company for the past year:

The association inspected a total of 2,191,492 lbs. of 1910 cheese, being divided among the following factories and the amounts set opposite their respective names, to-wit:

For such services the association charged 1-10 cent per lb. cheese manufactured at the several factories mentioned above, during the months of March, April, May, June, July and August. This brought the total revenue of the association to \$1,635.42. Association also received check on April 8, 1910, for \$24.52 for balance inspecting cheese for Ray Cheese Co. during 1909. There was a balance of \$108.62 on hand on Jan. 26, 1910.

Expenses for the year were as follows:

The item of \$75.00 paid to me was for expenses of my trip to Portland, Seattle and Tacoma during December, 1910, and January, 1911, looking up the cheese situation.

Resources are cash in bank and two accounts, a total of \$321.91.

Liabilities, none.

I think that for the coming year it will not be necessary to make the 1-10c. charge for more than the months of April, May, June and July.

I am pleased to report that the quality of cheese manufactured by the factories mentioned above meets with general satisfaction. There can be no doubt but what the inspection of our cheese is worth more than it costs. The only trouble is that the factories are so scattered that it is impossible for one man to make all of the county once each week, and there are also several that will not or do not want to see the benefit they can derive by coming into the association.

This cheese was graded for a high standard of excellence, and of the amount 63 Flats, 163 Y.A., and 1222, Triplets were of poor quality. The Secretary was informed as to the condition of the various lots, which enabled him to dispose of them without injury to the reputation of Tillamook's best stock. On examination of his records it will be found that this cheese brought various prices, from seven cents to within a cent of the market price.

With the exception of this small amount of inferior cheese, the quality has been very uniform at all the factories, due to the general use of commercial starter as a base, giving them all the same flavor to start with.

While some of the makers were opposed to it at first on account of extra labor in looking after it, they find their work is so much more satisfactory that they are more than repaid.

To meet this standard of excellence requires continuous and persistent effort on the part of the makers and they are entitled to much credit for the work which has been accomplished.

If a maker doesn't take an interest in his work and doesn't think enough of his job to try to excel, inspection will not help him, it will only expose him and he had better step out and let some one have the place who is willing to earn the money.
