**Capital Stock of \$100,000 Placed by New Corporation.**  
**SALEM, Or., March 1.**—For the purpose of constructing a railroad line with terminal at Tillamook, Bayocean and a point on Netarts Bay and to conduct a steamboat line from Bayocean and Tillamook to Portland and Columbia River points, articles of incorporation for the Tillamook Bay Railroad & Navigation Company were filed with the Secretary of State today.  
**T. Irving Potter, John K. Kollock and M. A. Zollinger are shown as the incorporators and the capital stock is placed at \$100,000. The principal place of business of the company will be in Portland.**
