**Port for Bayocean.**  
 A petition was filed in the County Clerk's office on Saturday calling for a special election to incorporate the Port of Bayocean. The new boundary is taken from the territory south of Tillamook bay, with an assessed valuation of \$1,000,000, but does not take in any timber tributary to Netarts. Should this port be established it will take care of the channel in the bay, which would be what is known as the Sturgeon channel, and this would relieve the Port of Tillamook of the expense and trouble of maintaining a channel in the bay. It seems to be mutually decided that the Port of Bayocean and the Port of Tillamook work together to obtain a suitable channel that would be of advantage to both places.  
**To Revise the City Charter.**  
 Mayor C. W. Talmage met with the Executive Board of the Commercial Club on Monday evening to talk over city affairs, especially as to making preparations for a sewerage system. Rollie W. Watson submitted a proposal from Warren Bros. Co. for bitulithic pavement, with a petition from the property owners on the business streets to have their streets paved. Mayor Talmage pointed out the needs of a sewerage system and was in favor of the Mayor, who was held responsible for the peace of the city, that he should be given power to appoint the marshal and police judge. It was ultimately decided by a vote that the city charter be amended and a committee appointed to prepare and present such amendments to provide for the Bancroft system of paying for street improvements and to amend the charter in other respects. ### Death of Sydney A. Christensen in Portland.

Died, Sydney A. Christensen, at 1204 East 27th Street, Portland, Ore., at 2:30 a.m., March 17th, 1911. The deceased, who was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Christensen of this place, was born at Tillamook, Oregon, April 23, 1863, and ever since has resided with his parents here, until recently, when he went to Portland to engage in his chosen work as machinist, but almost immediately upon arrival there was stricken with acute pneumonia, and in spite of the best medical skill, it proved fatal. His mother left for Portland as soon as the news of his sickness was received, and was with him until the end.

The news of this sudden death is a great shock to this entire community, where his sweet disposition, exemplary character and fascinating personality had won for him a wide circle of devoted friends. Besides, his devout, consecrated Christian life he was a source of constant inspiration to all with whom he came in contact. He was a member of the U. B. Church and Sunday School of this place, secretary of the same, also an officer of the Young People's Society. He was ever at his post of duty, not only in his home and the church, but in every walk of life where called to go, ready at all times to do whatever he could, for the helplessness of others, and with uniform courtesy towards all. He had a host of friends, not only in this place but elsewhere, who mourn the untimely death of this young man, whose life held so much promise, not only for success in his chosen work, but for his splendid example of ideal young manhood, which early Christian training in the home had developed in him to a degree seldom found in the young man of the present day. Although he had been in Portland such a short time, he had many warm friends there, who showed much kind attention and courtesy during his illness.

There were several former Tillamook friends with the mother and son, doing all they could to cheer and help during his sickness and subsequent death. Mrs. Christensen, accompanied by the lifelong friend and companion of the deceased, Horace Bibby, now of Grants Pass, arrived with the remains on the Golden Gate.

The services were held at the U. B. Church on Wednesday and the interment was made in the L.O.O.F. cemetery. Many beautiful floral emblems were given, both here and in Port-

land. The family have the deep sympathy of this whole community.

### Second Divorce Suit.

T. J. Bowles vs. Mary J. Bowles is a divorce suit filed in the Circuit Court. These parties were married the 5th September, 1877, at Lamars, Iowa, and a divorce was granted in this county, but the defendant promising to be a true and faithful wife, they were married for the second time at Portland, Ore., on the 23rd November, 1910. The ground for the present suit is that the defendant is guilty of such inhuman treatment and rendered such personal indignities to plaintiff as to render life burdensome to plaintiff. Plaintiff consents that defendant have control and custody of minor children.
