

**Editorial Snap Shots.**

You don't have to go to Washington to find "Standpatters." It is said that the saloon keepers have three standpat councilmen in this city under their control.

Just think for one moment if Tillamook City's water front was 300 feet wide what a great advantage it would be to the city, with thousands of visitors coming to the city this year.

Captain Anderson must have been looking for the highest place on the mud flats in the bay when he allowed the Anvil to drift and run aground. It is certainly time that owners of vessels employed captains with a little horse sense, for any kid would have used better judgment.

It seems to us that many of the delays caused by vessels grounding in the bay is an account of captains undertaking to navigate in channels which they are not familiar with. The captains need a little elementary education about Tillamook water ways before they imagine they know it all in making a few trips here.

Tillamook City is liable to get a lot of Sunday blind pigs if the city council repudiates its Home Rule ordinance. But, then, it is, probably, Home Rule to do so. Wonder whether it was all fixed with the "Standpat" city dads to vote for the ordinance which was introduced on Monday. The citizens will be justified in invoking the recall if this smooth piece of legislation is passed.

The question of sewerage for Tillamook City will have to be met at some future date. All will admit that it is necessary, for public health is one of the things which should be zealously guarded. The question of cost is probably the most difficult one to contend with, for it is going to take money to make this improvement, but under the Bancroft plan this can cover several years.

There is general complaint that business has been dull and slow in getting started this year. A large amount of money which found its way in other business channels is diverted to the saloons, and with the large amount of money expended for hay the past winter, may be two of the causes which have made money scarce and business dull this spring. But everything will be on the buzz in a few weeks, for it is impossible to keep Tillamook City from improving.

Keep your eye on the South side of Tillamook Bay. There are plenty of other places on the bay which will make splendid manufacturing locations, but when it comes to the survival of the fittest, the south side of the bay won't need any boosting, for it is the logical situation for saw mills and factories, away from the toredo and heavy winds. With the Sturgeon channel dug out and a railroad on that side of the bay, anyone who knows anything about the country must admit that it is going to become one of the most important, if not the most important, part of the bay.

There is a decided opinion that taxes are too high. Those who have just paid their taxes know this. But the best solution to high taxation is economy. Let every public body be more economical during the present year and then taxes won't come so high. But what is to be done when there is such a demand for improvements? The city wants cement pavement and paved streets and a sewerage system, the school district wants more school buildings, the Port wants harbor improvements and the County Court has numerous demands for road improvements and more bridges. That is the situation.

The "people" at the election in November adopted what is known as the Home Rule law, and the city council passed what is known as the Home Rule ordinance to regulate saloons. Now the saloon keepers want to repudiate the ordinance, for they have had introduced an ordinance to knock out the screen features of it, or in other words they will be able to keep people from rubbering into their place of business. Anyone can see that it is an attempt to run "Blind Pigs" on Sundays and

whenever the saloons should be closed. No doubt but what the ordinance will pass, for the saloon men can rely on the "Standpat" councilmen to help them out as usual. Now, who's "the people" in the administration of city affairs?

The Bay Cityites appear to be worked up some on account of the proposal to create a Port at Bayocean, the opening up of the Sturgeon channel and the building of a railroad on that side of the bay. There is no occasion for the city on the bay to become alarmed. Tillamook Bay is a big place and no one has a monopoly on town site property or desirable locations for factories. More there are of these the better, and if Bay City is to have a real live competitor it should make it hustle that much more. We have always had the impression that there will be several live towns on the bay some day, but the hub of commerce and industrial activity will continue to be centered in Tillamook City. So it is just as well for Bay City to look for competition on the opposite side of the bay, and look upon it as one of the many things which will help to develop the county as a whole.

Give Tillamook City a water front 300 feet wide and a channel 10 feet at low water and there will be a line of steamers plying between this city and San Francisco. We know of several instances where San Francisco parties have desired to start a line of steamers, but the trouble is we have such a dinkey little harbor front that the vessels they wanted to put on could not get up the slough nor turn round after they reached here. That alone ought to make this city get a hustle on and get the work started. Another thing, these vessels would take lumber and other material which were manufactured here, and in that way would also bring many visitors and others from California to see Tillamook county. This city has been too negligent of its own needs and it is time to wake up and help make business, which will put new life into the city.

The matter of bay and bar improvements will always be a burning question in Tillamook County until these improvements are taken in hand. The enthusiasm amongst the leading citizens was seen again last Monday at the meeting at the Tillamook Commercial Club. The matter now resolves itself down to this, as soon as the Port of Bayocean is organized it will be up to the three Ports to get together and decide upon some course of action in regard to the improvement of the bar. If the Ports think it is the wisest and best thing to tackle that job, well and good, but it seems to us that some assurance of government aid should be in sight before work is commenced. The same way with bonding the three Ports to the full amount. If no bar improvements are undertaken, only enough money should be raised for harbor improvements. We are fully alive to the fact, that with \$500,000 expended on a south jetty for the bar, and the work let out by contract, it will mean quick action, for if the government takes hold of the work it will be several years before it is started and it will drag along for a number of years before anything is accomplished.

**Another Deal Closed by a Tillamook Woman.**
