## EXCITING SCENE IN COURT ROOM.

### Judge Galloway Grills Parents of Delinquent Minor Child.

### GIRL SPIRITED AWAY.

### C. S. Wells and Wife Put Through a Rig'd Examination by the Acting District Attorney.

When Court convened Wednesday morning the witnesses in the case of State of Oregon vs. Henry McKinley were present, with one exception, Iva Wells, daughter of C. S. Wells. As it was freely circulated after the arrest of Henry McKinley and Thos. Holman that this witness would be spirited away before the case was called in the circuit court, a large number of persons were in the court room to witness the proceedings, and another attempt to defeat justice by tampering with the State's witnesses. The State's attorneys were ready for trial and counsel for the defendant expressed a desire to proceed. The sheriff was ordered to produce the witness, Iva Wells, but being unable to do so the father and mother of the girl were subpoenaed to appear before the court and they were placed on the witness stand by Judge Galloway, where they underwent a grilling examination by both the Court and Acting District Attorney Winslow.

Judge Galloway sat patiently through the rigid examination before taking a hand himself, and when no definite information was elicited from either father or mother of the girl, Judge Galloway said:

"This Court demands most emphatically that this girl be brought into court; with the good people of Tillamook County behind me in this matter; with the sheriff upholding me in this matter; with Mr. Winslow, the acting district attorney assisting me in this matter, I repeat most emphatically that this Grand Jury will not be dismissed and this court will not adjourn until this witness is produced, if we have to stay here all the Summer.

"How can you clear the name of your child of anything dishonorable if you insist upon hiding her from this Court?" inquired the judge of the parents of the girl. But you say you do not know where she is. The good name of your daughter is sacred to you for anything that reflects upon her good name re-bounds upon your name, the name of her parents. I not your standing in the community where you have lived to be based upon your acts as father and mother in this matter. It is your duty to produce her here in Court and let her state to all the world the conditions and the proof of her innocence. Would not that be better than hiding her away, or probably wandering among strangers? You say you do not know where she is, but you are not worried about her. Is it not possible that she is among strangers and subject to the temptations and machinations of evil men and women she might meet?

"This Court demands that you bring that child into this room. What do you think of it as a mother?"

Mrs. Wells: "I know she does not want to come here."

Judge Galloway: "But you say she would probably come back after this court adjourns. I want to tell you, both you and Mr. Wells, that you will have to bring that child into this court room and before this Grand Jury. I tell you now that all of the powers of this county, all of the powers of this Court will be used to bring about this result as long as the moral sentiment of this community, which I believe to be as high as any community in the State of Oregon, backs up this court. The sheriff will back up this court, the District Attorney will back up this Court, and I will stay here indefinitely, and this Grand Jury will not be discharged until they have examined this witness. The sheriff will bring to his aid every available man in the county, the District Attorney and the attorney for the defendant shall have every possible assistance, and I want you both to understand that the sooner that child is produced the better it will be for you both. We do not care whether she is 15 or 16 years old. You and your wife will be held responsible. Now go with the sheriff and bring that girl. This Court is in session as long as the people of this county desire the law upheld. If she is sick bring me the certificate of a reputable physician. There has been no crime charged against this girl. The Court knows that the people of this county want the law enforced, and you as loving parents should do all in your power to protect the name of your daughter by bringing her here and stating all the facts to this Grand Jury and the sooner you do so the better, for there will be no excusing of this
