### HOLMAN IS SENTENCED. To Pay a Fine of One Thousand Dollars.

On Wednesday morning Judge Galloway sentenced Thomos Holman, who was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor child, who, with Henry McKinley, induced two girls under 16 years of age to go to the rooms over the all night. Judge Galloway said in sentencing Holman:

"Owing to the nature of this indictment, and to the fact that you have entered a plea of guilty, thereby saving the expense and doubtful result of a trial at this time, and the further fact that the original charge filed against you will receive further consideration, the Court is unable to impose such a penalty as the enormity of the offence demands.

"You have been charged and have pleaded guilty to contributing to the downfall and desecration of the person of a child under the age of consent, or 16 years; a crime the most henious in the catalogue of


