TWO MARKET DAYS EACH MONTH.

Tillamook City Merchants will Auction Off Farmers' Stock, Etc., Free.

Tillamook City is to have an Auction Mart. One week from next Saturday, May 20th, the merchants of this city will hold the first of a series of market days, it being decided that the first and third Saturdays in each month are to be devoted for that purpose. The principle feature of these market days will be the auction sales of stock, implements, wagons, harness, etc., which the merchants will endeavor to dispose of free of charge to the farmers, and in that way it is hoped that an exchange mart can be established which will be of mutual interest to sellers as well as buyers. The merchants have engaged C. E. Reynolds as auctioneer, and the Headlight will publish a list of the property to be disposed of in our next issue if those interested will furnish us with the items. The advertising and auction will all be done free of charge.

It is expected that the market days will cause considerable interest and will bring a large number of persons to the city, for this section of the county has been in need of public market days and a central location where the farmers can exchange, sell or trade their cows, bulls, horses, young stock, hogs, poultry, implements, etc. As the merchants have undertaken to open a way whereby an exchange mart can be established, it is to be hoped that the farmers will take a lively interest in these events, for it is for their benefit that these market days are arranged.

Another thing, should there be much stock offered for sale in this way, it will give the farmers some idea of prevailing prices and the demand for different kinds of stock, as well as other property.

A committee was appointed on Wednesday, composed of C. I. Clough, E. T. Haltom and A. Stillwell, to look after the details, and in all probability the merchants this summer while these market days are in progress offer prizes for the best grades of dairy stock, horses, chickens, and the best displays of fruits and vegetables, as well as furnish music and other attractions for those who visit the city on market days.

Apart from all this, the merchants will offer bargains and dispose of their goods with but little profit, so as to encourage trading with home industries and home merchants, for by doing your trading at home it helps to build up and boost Tillamook.
