His factory checks amounted to \$493.23, and using about 300 pounds of milk per month for home consumption, which he valued at \$54.00, making an average of \$136.81. It is Jersey cows which Mr. Hare is milking, one of which is now giving 52 pounds of milk a day with a 4.4 test. Mr. Hare lives on a three acre tract of land north of Tillamook City and raises most of his feed on the place.
