PASTOR IS NOT GUILTY. Reformed Synod Acquits Ebinger of Heresy Charge.

CANTON, O., May 23.—After a spirited discussion which lasted half a day, the General Synod of the Reformed (German) Church of the United States, in session here, late today acquitted Rev. Paul Ebinger, of Tillamook, Ore., accused of heresy. The vote of the delegates who sat as a jury in the case was 79 to 70.

Defending Rev. Mr. Ebinger against a charge that he had preached a disbelief in the divine inspiration, of the Bible, and had expressed doubt as to whether Moses had written the ten commandments under divine inspiration, Rev. G. Gekeler, of Lima, appeared before the church court. He declared Rev. Mr. Ebinger preached that the Bible was written as the word of God, but that some slight mistakes had been made in the verbiage.

A letter from Mr. Ebinger was read in which he defended himself. J. M. Hirsch, of Portland, Ore., appeared against Mr. Ebinger. He acted in behalf of the Portland classis of the church, which suspended the pastor. The accused minister then took his case to the Synod of the Northwest, which favored him. The classis carried up the case.

The matter of the proposed union of the Reformed and Presbyterian churches the general synod decided to refer the question back to the classis districts, or subdivisions, for information before definite action is taken.

The classis will refer the question back to the general synod in Lancaster, Pa., and the action of the synod then will be again referred back to the classis for final settlement.

High authorities in the church believe the union of the two churches will be eventually effected.
