John R. Harter vs. W. S. Cone is a case decided in the Supreme Court in favor of Harter, which reverses the decision of the lower court. This was a case where the legal title was in favor of Harter, but Cone claimed the land at Bay City, by virtue of two tax deeds. Harter brought suit in ejectment and tendered the amount of taxes and penalties in person to Mr. Cone, who would not accept the money or relinquish the property. The lower court held that Cone had had his first deed for more than three years and that gave him title to the land. The supreme court reversed the lower court on the ground that in order to secure title under the three year limitation that he would have to have actual possession of the property, while in fact, he had but constructive possession.

The Alumni Association met at the High School building Wednesday evening for the purpose of enjoying the first annual business meeting and banquet of their association.
