Editorial Snap Shots.

Hellow! Grandpa Goyne!

Don't be a grumbler and don't be a "knocker." Get the boosting spirit and boost.

Isn't the city getting tough, and more so, all the time, since the people were fooled to vote for Home Rule.

Other than to prove that the Port law is constitutional, we are inclined to think that is all that the money subscribed for will amount to.

A gallon house on the outskirts of the city would prove a profitable business and would help to smash up the monopoly. It's a wonder to us that someone have not caught on before this.

Tillamookers who went to the Portland Rose Festival all report having a splendid time. When the weather gets too hot Portlanders can come to Tillamook and have a splendid time as well this summer.

The city council will be perfectly justified in granting the restaurant keepers beer and wine licenses. The city needs the money and the poor man and those who drink don't like to be robbed of 10c. for a small drink of beer. Anyway, as it is not the malt drinks which make men intoxicated, for it is the spirituous drinks which are largely responsible for that, we believe the city council should grant these licenses, but with this restriction, not to dispose of drinks behind screens or in private rooms.

Everybody from this county who saw the Tillamook float at the Rose Festival in Portland were well pleased at the splendid showing, which was one of the best commercial floats there, and, undoubtedly, would have been awarded a prize had there been any set apart for that style of float. Tillamook County has received a great amount of advertising of late, which, compared with the large amount of money expended by other counties for advertising, have cost this county comparatively little. The local newspapers have sent out a large amount of literary matter in recent years, and in that way have done considerable effective advertising. A great deal of credit is due those who hustled to make the Tillamook float such a success, for the great crowds cheered it as it passed them in the parade, and it seems that most every Tillamooker did his part in helping swell the great ovation the float received.

Tillamook County, like most places, have had more or less chronic "knockers," who must, it seems, have something to grumble about. They grumble if no public improvements are going on. They grumble if there are and the improvements are not being carried out according to their ideas. They grumble about taxes and want the other fellow to pay for public improvements, etc. They say we need pay rolls, but they do not belong to that progressive class who invest in new industries. We want to repeat that Tillamook county is all right and it would make much greater progress if the "knockers" and the grumblers would hold their whist for a while and allow the progressive citizens to lay the foundation for making Tillamook County a second Grays' Harbor for the manufacture of lumber and shingles. It will not be out of place to repeat a short editorial which appeared in the Headlight a few weeks after it was started. Here it is, for it is just as good advice today as it was 24 years ago:

The following was handed us by Rev. A. Nickols, who found it posted on his fence. He says he will make improvements around the parsonage if any one will furnish the lumber and doesn't think he is much of a kicker either. The item is pretty good, and we hope some one will put it in their pipe

and smoke it, while others can paste it in their hats so it won't get away. If there is anything we like it is a kicker—one of those old-fashioned kickers who can knock the rim off the moon and send the stars all to bed with a headache. Here is the item. Read it:

"Every public improvement adds to the value of your property. Encourage every legitimate enterprise. If you will not work and push and pull yourself, at least shout, hurrah and clap your hands to cheer those who do. Don't object and kick and grumble. Don't stand in the way of progress. Don't whine and cuss the country. Better leave it. Nobody will object and many will bless you for it. The country is all right. The trouble is with you. Join the procession. Pull together. Encourage immigration, development and progress. Don't kick and squirm. Don't be a nuisance. Your own interests are involved in the matter. Put your dollars in county improvements and your shoulder to the wheel and an intelligent effort will achieve success. Don't forget it."

There may be quite a few persons who attempt to thwart the progress and development of the county, yet, for all that, the progressive citizens will succeed because they are progressive. Knocking and complaining may retard for a time the growth of the county, just as it did in the early history of this city and county—not so many years ago either—when persons who came to Tillamook to locate were informed that they were not wanted here. As this was an ideal dairying country was impossible to keep people out, and as a result we have a dairy industry that Tillamook people are proud of, and in a comparatively few years modern school houses, bridges and a large amount of good roads have been built. This helped the dairy industry as much as anything, but we do not hear one word of complaint that for a long number of years the bulk of the tax money went to bring about the improvements, and we want to say right here that Tillamook county is making rapid progress and the progressive officials who went ahead, and paid no heed to those who complained about the expense, are deserving of a great deal of credit. Is the progress of Tillamook county to stop at the dairying industry? Hardly so. The timber owners, who have been paying about 75 per cent of the taxes for schools, bridges and roads, who have received no benefits for the large proportion of taxes they have paid, are entitled to some recognition when it comes to bar and harbor improvements. So it is just as well for the dairymen to be as magnanimous towards the timber men as the timber men were magnanimous towards the dairymen in the latter getting good schools, good bridges and good roads largely at the timber owners' expense.

We believe in the spirit of give and take in helping to foster all new industries, especially the lumber industry, which will be of so large magnitude in a few years in this county that the dairy industry will be insignificant compared to it. Personal and selfish interests must not and should not cut any figure in the progress, development and industrial growth of the county.

Land values, and especially dairy farms, have reached their height in this county, and it will not be long before normal prices will prevail again, for the inflated valuations placed upon some meadow land cannot continue much longer. It is simply a matter of dollars and cents how much cow feed can be taken off a dairy farm and turned into butter or cheese. And it does not require a mathematician to figure it out, for every intelligent dairyman knows how many cows his farm will sustain and what revenue he will receive at prevailing prices. But, unfortunately, the inflated valuations placed on dairy lands have caused two things, first, home seekers are astounded and go to other places where land is much cheaper or to the irrigated districts where they can grow three crops of alfalfa each year upon land that is not nearly so expensive as the land is now in this county; and, second, the inflated values have caused the assessments on dairy lands to be raised, and, consequently, taxes have been growing in like proportion, simply because some dairy farms have changed hands at inflated values and the dairymen in all parts of the county thinking their places just as valuable have jumped them up in price also. Now there is considerable complaint about taxes, and this is some-

thing which will help to knock the wind out of inflated land values. Those who have been holding their farms or bought them at inflated figures have no reason to complain at the high assessment, but it is those who want to remain on their dairy farms and do not want to sell out who have just cause to complain on account of higher assessments and higher taxes, yet in laying the blame for this they thoughtlessly jump onto county officials who have done their duty, and overlook the fact that it is those who have boosted lands skyward who are responsible for the increase in taxes. But as long as dairy land is held and sold at high prices, there is no other alternative for the assessor to make the assessment correspondingly high. There is quite a little complaint just now about taxes and the tendency is, as someone is to be singled out for a scape goat, the county court is unjustly criticised for a condition of things over which they had no jurisdiction in the market and prevailing price of land. There are always two sides to every question, and those who place high prices on their dairy farms must naturally expect high assessments and high taxes.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETINGS.

Circular Letter Sent Out by Superintendent Alderman.

Superintendent of Public Instruction L. R. Alderman has sent out the following circular in regard to the annual school meetings this year, which takes place on June 19:

OREGON SCHOOL PATRONS.—May I not ask for your co-operations to the extent of giving a part of one day in the year to the consideration of public school questions? We are planning this year in the State of Oregon, to make the annual school meeting day a great day by having as many of our people as possible attend the meeting and learn conditions of our school plants. We expect to have an annual picnic on this day in many school districts, and we hope that every one interested in the district school will be present and help the school officers in making this event a great success.

The annual school meeting in your district, this year, occurs on June 19. Please take the time on the morning of the 19th to go over to the school house and look over the school grounds and school buildings. See if you can help to have conditions improved if they need improvement; if they do not, I ask you to show your appreciation to the members of the School Board who brought about these conditions without pay or without thanks. Some of our school buildings are very unsanitary, and our schools will not be what they should be until we have the united support of all our school patrons.

Meet at 11:00 a.m.

- 1.—Inspection of Grounds.
 - (a) Size, condition, freedom from stumps, rubbish, etc.
 - (b) Water:
 - 1.—If well, when was it cleaned; condition of pump, drainage of grounds.
 - 2.—If no well, have you an enclosed jar or tank with faucet?
 - (c) Outhouses: Are they sanitary?
 - (d) Are the school grounds fenced?
