

PORT LAW ATTACKED

On Ground that it is Unconstitutional and Port of Tillamook not a Legal Body.

INJUNCTION SUIT FILED.

To Restrain Port from Levying Taxes and from Paying Interest on Bonds.

A suit was filed in the Circuit Court, on Wednesday, by the State of Oregon, upon the relation of S. V. Anderson and Lillian Anderson vs. The Port of Tillamook, a pretended quasi municipal corporation, H. T. Botts, A. G. Beals, D. Fitzpatrick, James Walton, jr., and M. F. Leach, which attacks the constitutionality of the Port law.

Plaintiffs demand judgment that said pretended Port of Tillamook be adjudged an unlawful usurpation of the powers, territory, and property and privileges of the legal Port of Tillamook, enacted by the Legislative assembly of the State of Oregon, in 1899, and that the same be ousted from the exercise of its attempted functions.

Also, plaintiffs demand judgment, that said Chapter 39, of the laws of 1909, attempting to authorize the formation of Ports, is a violation of the Constitution of Oregon and is void.

Also plaintiffs demand judgment that said Port of Tillamook has not been incorporated in the mode and manner provided in said Chapter 39 of the laws of Oregon, 1909, and

that said Port is not a duly incorporated Port within the State of Oregon and is illegal and that its said attempted incorporation be annulled by the judgment of the court.

Also plaintiffs demand judgment that the defendant have usurped, intruded into and unlawfully hold and exercise a public office within the State of Oregon, and that said defendant by judgment of this court be ousted therefrom.

Also, plaintiffs demand judgment that the Port of Tillamook has not been incorporated in accordance with Chapter 39, laws of 1909, for the reason that there is already a legally incorporated Port of Tillamook, covering part of the same territory and there is no authority to incorporate a second Port under Chapter 39 of the laws of 1909 that territory being occupied by the lawful Port.

Also, plaintiffs demand judgment, that the attempted incorporation of the Port of Tillamook is not in accordance with Chapter 39, the laws of 1909, because of the facts alleged in the complaint and that the same be so adjudged and annulled.

Suit was also filed by W. H. Leach and Eva M. Leach against the Port of Tillamook for a temporary injunction restraining the defendants from attempting to levy or collect any taxes or for payment of bonds.

In the matter of the petition of C. J. Blanchard and others for a County road, report of viewers was accepted and same was ordered opened for public travel.

In the matter of the platting of Fair Port, F. R. Beals presents for approval plat of the same, located in Sec. 35, T. 3, N. R. 10, W. Plat approved.

In the matter of the approval of the plat of Barview, Lloyd C. Smith presents the same for approval, located in Sec. 18 and 27, T. 1, N. R. 10, W. Plat approved.

In the matter of the approval of Rowe's addition to Wheeler, same is approved.

In the matter of the approval of the plat of Elmore Park, Paul Schrader, Tillie Schrader, John Groat, John T. Toner, and Martha T. Stoner, present the same for approval. Located in Sec. 5, T. 1 N. R. 10 west. Plat is approved.

Storage Battery Possibilities.

It has long been admitted by those most advanced in electrical science that if the storage battery could be made economical it would supersede other methods of utilizing electrical power. The question is one of cost and practical adaptabilities. Storage batteries are safe and free from any incidental unpleasant features. But they have been expensive, their weight is great, range of action limited, and methods of recharging slow. They would be preferred if these difficulties could be overcome. For several years Edison has been at work to reduce the storage battery in weight and cost, and at the same time increase its efficiency. His statement that he has succeeded in an interesting announcement. Last year it was known that he had invented a storage-battery cell especially adapted for traction. In appearance it differs little from the original Edison cell of 1901, but both positive and negative plates have been radically modified, and he has the chemical solution used. The claim last year was that the new battery can not be injured by overcharging, that it does not deteriorate, and that, tested by weight, it had double the mileage of other batteries.

Now the inventor tells of later important improvements, and his opinion goes far with the world in all such questions. It was years before he brought the incandescent light to the form in which it became a common utility, but from the first he maintained that the fundamental idea was best and that its essential success was certain. Step by step, Edison has similarly improved his storage-battery cell, and probably can better it still more, chemically, mechanically and in materials. But the light-weight battery he says he has now attained could be applied so readily, distributed so widely and employed in so many convenient ways at slight cost that, if it meets Edison's expectations, a revolution in motive power is at hand. If a cheap storage battery capable of moving a vehicle seventy miles can be carried in a suit case, as Edison says, and recharged in three minutes, the resources for applying safe, economic power are about to be expanded immensely.

History is repeating itself in a Democratic House.
