Editorial Snap Shots.

Now is the time for the City Council to take action to prevent a "humped backed" railroad crossing at the saw mill.

With an enormous amount of beach and newly platted town lots selling at big figures, this class of property should be assessed much higher than they were last year.

To hold down their jobs working for the county, it is reported to us that men with teams are on time in the morning and do not quit before time. The custom of getting to work late and going home to milk the cows before the day's work was done is accountable for some of the leakage in the road fund and little accomplished by way of road improvements. The County Court will not tolerate that loose system, hence there is a rustle to get to work on time for fear of being "fired" by the road supervisor.

We hear much discussion in regard to the sovereign will of the people, but see how it works in Tillamook County. It was the sovereign will of the people to elect a Port of Tillamook for the express purpose of making harbor improvements. Not willing to abide by the sovereign will of the people, a large number of our citizens have started in to override the will of the people. Isn't it funny when those who make such a fuss about the sovereign will of the people when it comes to putting it into actual experience they immediately balk. This is the essence of inconsistency.

Suppose, for some technical reason, the Port of Tillamook is declared illegally elected, steps will be immediately taken to organize another Port, for the progress of Tillamook and the sovereign will of the people cannot be retarded by the sovereign will of the minority. It is time that this blotched up county made some progress, and although it may delay the county's progress for a time to drag the Port through the courts, harbor improvements will be carried out eventually, no matter how much money is pungled up for obstructionists attorneys. This is how the Oregonian puts it:

The Tillamook farmers who do not believe in paying for harbor improvement have come all the way to Portland to hire Attorney to way to obstruct. They don't believe in hiring amateurs.

Those who have plows, scrapers and other tools belonging to the county in their possession had better disgorge, for it appears that a good deal of pilfering has been going on in the past of these implements. The County Judge has been rounding some of them up, and in that way saving the county the expense of buying new ones. As there seems to be a tendency on the part of some persons to carry off tools belonging to the county, in future they should be marked or branded with a county mark. And another thing we hope the court will devote a little time to, and that is the proper care of the road machinery in having it housed and gathered together when not needed during the winter months or when not in use.

Railroad water transportation has been and will continue to be an important question in this county, for it is the need of it which have kept Tillamook bottled up. Tom Richardson hit the nail on the head that it would be the height of business folly to expect men to put their money into saw mills and factories under present conditions. His advice to the people of this county was to improve the harbor, and when this is done industries would soon follow, and with it large pay rolls would be ensured. It is, however, hard to impress this upon some of our people. It was water transportation which enabled the cheese industry of the county to

reach its present magnitude. The same thing will foster the lumber industry, and as soon as the harbor is improved, making it possible for larger vessels to enter, industries will spring up in every direction and there will be plenty of work for men. But the first thing is plenty of water for large vessels.

The snap shot man spent the whole of Tuesday rubbernecking on the south side of Tillamook bay, and notwithstanding that a strong, cold northwest wind was blowing in from the sea, it was warm and pleasant on that side of the bay. (More we see of Tillamook bay, much stronger are we convinced that Sturgeon channel should be opened up and a wagon road built on the south side of the bay. Property owners have a right to ask for a road, for there are many thousand acres in that locality which have been paying taxes for years and have no roads, while places like Fairview, the Miami and other places have had large amounts of road money expended there.

Bay Cityites would show good judgment in not "knocking" Tillamook City. One individual who resides at the city on the bay wanted the yacht Bayocean to call at Bay City but not at Tillamook City, because, he said, it was a winding way up here. Let us remark right here that the city which is at the head of navigation and right in the heart of the richest dairying section of the state, with all the timber in the Tillamook bay water shed tributary to it, is not at all jealous of Bay City. For instance, Tillamook City is shipping between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 pounds of cheese annually, while little or none is shipped from Bay City, and as to the incoming freight for bay points, the bulk of it is now going to Bayocean, which is another strong argument in favor of the Sturgeon channel be dredged out for the convenience of Bayocean, and to open up the south side of the bay with its natural channel, and the safest and best side of the bay for shipping and saw mills and factories, if they should happen to locate on the bay.

We believe that a large amount of the idle land in Tillamook County should be taxed as much as the improved land, for we do not consider it right that the person who is industrious and makes wealth out of his land should be compelled to pay a large proportion of the taxes, while the person who allows his land to remain idle and enhance in value because of his neighbor's industry. Land that can be tilled and is not should pay as much taxes as that which is. That would help some in relieving those who till the ground, of some of the burdens of taxation and would make those who do not bear their share of taxation do so. In fact, if the snap shot man was doing the assessing he would feel justified in assessing the idle land higher than the tilled land, for the reason that idle land grows up to all kinds of weeds and is a menace to everybody in the neighborhood, as well as a eye sore to the county.

This is the time of year when Tillamook is infested with advertising fakirs and a word of advice at the present time will not be out of place from the Press of this county. Business men are the first to advise newspaper men to advocate patronizing home industries and are the first to complain when some outside concern or stranger comes here, who pay no taxes and takes away business. As a great many persons buy a pig in a poke from strangers, we find that a large number of business men "bite" at most every advertising fake which comes along, and in this respect they are no better than those who patronize strangers who come here to sell goods. If sauce is good for the goose, it is also good for the gander, and it is surprising how many business men will patronize advertising fakirs and will not advertise in the home newspapers, which are recognized as the best advertising mediums. Every advertising fakir takes more or less money out of the city. There was one here last week who got away with a "wad" from the business men, and we suppose it will not be long before others will follow with some other kind of a graft.

It is generally conceded that the Nehalem country will become an important manufacturing part of Tillamook county at no distant date. Its enormous timber and other resources is an assurance of the bright outlook and future there is ahead for the north end of the county. Where the center of commerce will be have been a question of some consideration for many years, but since the railroad opened up that bottled-up section, many important developments are taking place which naturally follow the advent of the iron horse. The matter of town sites have caused some contention, but it seems it was left to Fred R. Beals to size up the logical location, and being far sighted and having implicit confidence in the Nehalem country, he bought up a tract of land which promises to become the center of commerce for that part of the county, the same as Tillamook City is the center of commerce for the center of the county. Mohler is the name of the new town site, and we predict that it will become the largest and most important city in the north of the county on account of its logical situation.
