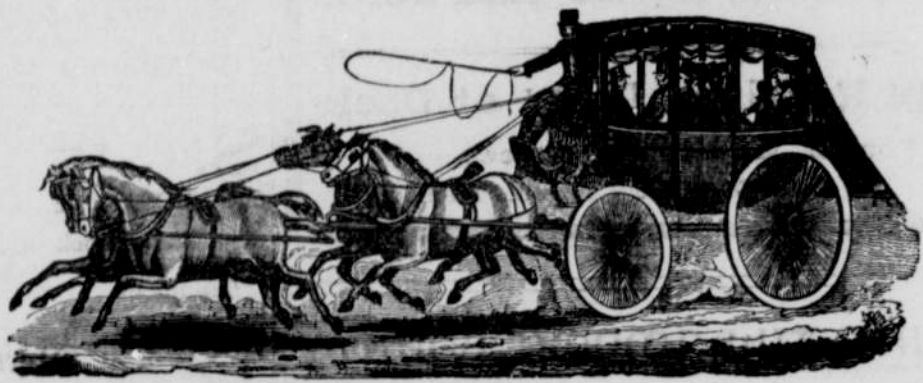


PORT OF BAYOCEAN.

Territory to be Taken in at the Special Election July 1st.

Beginning at a point on the shore of the Pacific Ocean at the southwest corner of lot 2, section 7, township 1 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence in a generally northerly and northeasterly direction along the shore of the Pacific Ocean to the north and northeasterly corner of lot 1, section 19, township 1 N., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence north 23 3/4 degrees E. to the center of the channel at the entrance of Tillamook Bay; thence to a generally southeasterly direction along the middle line of the middle or main ship channel of Tillamook Bay to a point where the same interests the section line between sections 15 and 16, township 1 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian, produced in the northerly direction; thence south to the southwest corner of section 34, township 1 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian, and running thence east 1 mile to the northwest corner of section 2 in township 2 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; and running thence south 3 miles to the southwest corner of section 14, in township 2 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence east 11 miles to the southeast corner of section 16 in township 2 S., range 8 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence south to the southeast corner of section 21, township 2 S., range 8 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence west 3 miles to the southwest corner of section 19, township 2 S., range 8 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence south to southeast corner of township 2 S., range 9 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence west along the township line between township 2 S. and township 3 S. 9 miles to the northeast corner of Tillamook Forest Reserve and the southwest corner of section 34, township 2 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence north 5 miles to the southwest corner of section 3, township 2 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence north 1/2 mile; thence north along the quarter section line in section 4, township 2 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian, and sections 33 and 28 to the north line of said section 28, township 1 S., range 10 west of the Willamette Meridian; thence west to the Pacific Ocean; and thence north on the shore of the Pacific Ocean to the point of beginning,

The Parcels Post.

The United States—or perhaps one should say Congress—has the queer notion that a thing may be an international blessing and a national misfortune. That is irrational, but it keeps us from having the parcels post at home. If an American wishes to send through the mails an 11-pound parcel at a moderate rate per pound he must leave the country to do it. He must go to some one of the countries with which there is a parcels post convention—Mexico for instance.

There is now forty-one of these parcels post conventions. The last of them was with Haiti. It was concluded last week after several years negotiation. The postmaster general was finally able to persuade the rather unprogressive and unenlightened government of that dark country of the advantages of the parcels post.

Strangely enough, he has not been able to persuade Congress to permit him to make a trial of it on a small scale in this country. One might draw from that a conclusion unfavorable to the intelligence of Congress. It does seem odd that it should refuse to grant to the white men of the United States facilities which it allows the postmaster general to extend to the colored men of Haiti.

We now have parcels post convention with about all the civilized and quasi-civilized nations of the globe, and yet persist in denying to Americans at home the facilities which are enjoyed by them when they leave the country. How long will it be before Congress shall recognize the absurdity of this?

The Kingdom of God.

Senator Cullom, whose long experience qualifies him to be judge, says that the Senate will debate the reciprocity pact at least two months before reaching a vote on it. This, after the summer has begun in such an earnest way is not reassuring.

Col. Goethals states that, at the latest, ships will be passing through the Panama Canal by October, 1913, and probably three months earlier. He suggests that the scale of tolls be fixed at once. There will be a good deal of celebrating long before the official date in 1915.

Now that Postmaster General Hitchcock is placing the postal service of the country on a paying basis his critics are reviving the old cry that the public prefers an enlarged service to a self-supporting one. You can not please all of the people some of the time, nor some of the people any of the time.

Germany, too, gives official notice of her willingness to consider an arbitration treaty on the lines laid down in Secretary Knox's provisional draft which has been submitted to England and France. As Japan moved in the same direction a week ago, the arbitration idea is making proselytes just about as quickly as the presses can print the proposed pacts. It is safe to say that the prospective signers to these agreements are coming forward a little faster than either the secretary of state or the president expected.

The plains of Western Canada have recently developed into wheat fields by the aid of the power tractor. In 1900, about the time the tractor plow became unquestionably practical, there were fewer than 2,500,000 acres sown to wheat between Winnipeg and the mountains. In 1909 Saskatchewan alone had 4,085,000 acres sown to wheat, which yielded 90,250,000 bushels, or more than Manitoba and Alberta combined. Manitoba had 2,643,111 acres, which yielded 45,774,707 bushels. These three provinces combined thus had 7,058,111 acres, which yielded a total of 14,279,107 bushels, or more wheat in one year than the entire German empire. The wonderful product is a tribute to the progress made possible by the use of improved machinery.

Tales of vanishing preachers continue to be told, coming from every section of the country and including practically all of the evangelical denominations. The latest comes out of the state convention of the New York Congregationalists which has been in session at Lockport during the past week. It was reported to the meeting, in an official way, that it has been found impossible to provide pastors for a hundred Congregational churches in different parts of that state. The average salary in the vacant pastorates is \$500 a year. The report adds that the high cost of living makes it impossible even for an unmarried pastor to live on such an income.

It is remarkable, the chatter of nonsense which can follow an important decision, the chattering coming from what are sometimes supposed to be seats of wisdom. Because the chief justice, in the course of an opinion which illuminated a complicated subject from every point of view, expressed the opinion that a "rule of reason" must govern courts in their application of law to an evil, there is an outburst to the effect that the Supreme Court of the United States has read law into the federal statutes which Congress had not put there; that it has interpolated words and meanings into the Sherman law which have no rightful place there, and that it has usurped a power of legislation nowhere conferred upon it.

Rev. Mr. Elayer of the Wagoner Place M. E. Church, said in the morning sermon delivered on Sunday that discussions of the higher

criticism in the pulpit put people to sleep. There can be no doubt of it. Any intelligent discussion of the higher criticism must necessarily be scientific in character. We have never been able to understand how a sermon of that kind can keep people awake as surely as one of the old-fashioned kind, filled with sulphur and brimstone, or which points to the Rock of Ages as the one hope of the race. The higher criticism is for the higher order of minds, lovers of truth, who seek it for its own sake. Even these must nod at times over great deliverances of great thinkers. When they do they lay the work aside, to be again taken up when mind and body are more active.

If the Democratic party needs warning against the possible effects of a popular tendency to contrast the wool-protection policy of their majority in Congress with President Taft's apparent awakening to the advantages of free trade, Republican progressives also need a warning, and one not altogether dissimilar. Their opposition to Canadian reciprocity is almost certain to ruin them in national politics. They are not to be criticized lightly on this question, any more than the Democrats on the wool-tariff, for their position is one of responsibility and difficulty. It may be, too, that the Taft reciprocity agreement was set for them as a trap. But to the outsider it would appear that they are less likely to be trapped if they pick up the trap and walk away with it than if they try to kick it aside.
