**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Every progressive citizen in this county should wear a badge with "Tillamook Booster" inscribed on it.

Money makes money pretty fast when you can persuade a person to dispose of his county warrant for 85c. or 90c. on the dollar.

Hill is to spend millions on railroads in Oregon. Yet it is often asserted by some people that money is scarce. It does not look so.

We are beginning to think that there must be a matrimonial club for young men over at Bayocean by the number of young brides who have gone to reside there from this city.

Some reporter got mixed in his figures in the report of some of the Portland newspapers that Jim Hill was going to appropriate \$25,000,000 to be expended on railroads in this state.

We hear quite often that it is the real estate agents who are to be blamed for the high price of land in this county. Hardly so. Every once in a while a well known farm was sold at a big figure, and others who had dairy farms thinking their land just as valuable, or more so, have jumped up the price of their farms so often that they cannot jump them up higher.

We are reliably informed that work on the Tillamook branch of the United Railways will soon be started, and we look for the announcement to be made any day for the work to commence, not only at Banks, but at the Tillamook end and at several places along the route. There is no doubt but what the people of Tillamook county will give the United Railways the glad hand.

Notwithstanding that the two city newspapers publish every item of county expenditure, yet we often hear people say they want to know where the money goes. They will find that a great big proportion of it is expended all over the county in road work and giving children free education. See this issue of the Headlight for the amount of money that was distributed for one month amongst the farmers for road work.

A word of advice to "knockers." Either move away from the county or get in and boost. The snap shot man is tired of hearing a few chronic "knockers" who are continually belly-aching. It is time that every "knocker" was blacklisted and his name exposed to the public gaze, for we do not consider that there is the least cause to "knock" in Tillamook county, unless there is too much prosperity and beautiful cool weather, to say nothing of the great future of the county.

Strange, and, oh, so strange! Money is scarce, so it is said, and that is one reason why that county warrants have suddenly dropped below par. But there appears to be plenty of money around and a big scramble to get hold of them at a discount. And as to the question of their legality no question is raised as long as they can be bought at a discount. Tillamook's county warrant "bull" and "bear" pit fight is interesting just now, and after it is all over there are liable to be scars and hard feelings against those who started the agitation. We are not alarmed, however, for it will not be long before this little flutter is over.

The discounting of county warrants is unwarranted and a shame, as well as usury. The "knockers" and the curb stone agitators, who have been maligning the County Court, are responsible for bringing this about, and it will sooner or later act as a boomerang. This county would be far better off if it had more progressive citizens and less "knockers" and moss-

backs. But, happily, the progressive citizens cannot be kept down and will exert their supremacy. A few years ago, when the county was not so well fixed financially as it is today, the warrants were sold in some cases at a premium. The senseless agitation have not only made county warrants to be sold at a discount, but will also put a stop to a whole lot of road improvement this summer, and those who have been in the habit of working on the roads will be deprived of a good deal of employment this summer. Thanks to the "knockers" and the unprogressive mossbacks of this county.

It is a matter of regret to the people of Tillamook City that anyone should attempt to drag so commendable an enterprise as that carried on by the T. B. Potter Realty Co. at Bayocean into the courts. True we do not like the ear-marks of some of those who are back of the movement to change the management, for it savors more of the "Salem Hog" than anything else. The Headlight will once more commend the Potter Realty Co. for the work carried out and what is contemplated, and although it is a matter of opinion as to how the enterprise should be managed and carried to completion, there is bound to be difference of opinion, and more so, when avaricious persons, who have done nothing to up-build and develop Oregon, want to be appointed receiver. It is the same old story, directly a person or a corporation undertakes to improve conditions, there are those who camp on their trail and attempt to pull down. But, coming from certain Salem people, does not surprise us much. We want to say again that we admire the pluck and the Western grit of those who undertook to make the peninsula on Tillamook bay a great summer resort, and they should be given a free hand to consummate their plans. Another thing, there is no assurance, should the petitioners gain their point, that a receiver would carry on the improvements more expeditiously than is being done. Work is too far advanced, with a large amount of money already expended on preliminary construction, to stop the enterprise.

It was hard to make people believe at the time of the Maine disaster that the battleship and many valuable lives were lost on account of internal and not from external causes. The popular clamor was that Spain blew up the Maine, and which was the real cause of the war with that country. Those who were familiar with the many distressing accidents which have taken place on board of battle ships in all parts of the world believed that the Maine disaster was simply another chapter in the many accidents which preceded it. Appalling as the accident was, it was no worse than what have happened to a large number of English war ships through spontaneous combustion and other causes. With a large amount of explosives and combustible material stored away on battle ships it is a surprise that more accidents does not occur. It is now a settled fact that the Maine was destroyed by the explosion of her own munitions of war, and no longer does the popular slogan of "Remember the Maine" hold good to create a war spirit in this county against Spain. Here is another instance where popular clamor became intense with nothing to warrant it. Yet we are wondering what is to be done with the court of inquiry's report that the Maine was destroyed from exterior explosion now that the government engineers have decided, since the water was pumped out of the dam which was built around the wreck and the real cause ascertained, that the vessel was destroyed from internal explosions.
