

> The principal liability of the company consists of outstadding insurance policies aggregating \$266, 305.25. The two Nolans each has a claim for \$300 for back salary. There are also unsecured claims against the company aggregating \$8573.24. This item includes a number of insurance polices, which while approved, have not been liquidated.

> Among its assets, the company reports unpaid insurance premiums aggregating \$4605,38. In their bankruptcy petition, the officers of the company say the polices written by the company and on which the premiums have not been paid in full, may be disposed of to some other insurance company, increasing to that extent the assets of the concern.
