INSURANCE FIRM BANKRUPT.

Liabilities \$275,000, Assets \$5500 in Statement of Oregon Company.

With only \$2.85 cash on hand, the Phoenix Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Oregon, with offices in the Chamber of Commerce building, Thursday filed in the United States Court a voluntary petition in bankruptcy. In their petition A. E. Nolan, president, and Oak Nolan, secretary-manager of the company, confess liabilities aggregating \$275,508.49, while their available assets are listed at \$5547.42.

The principal liability of the company, consists of outstanding insurance policies aggregating \$206,365.25. The two Nolans each has a claim for \$300 for back salary. There are also unsecured claims against the company aggregating \$8573.24. This item includes a number of insurance policies, which while approved, have not been liquidated.

Among its assets, the company reports unpaid insurance premiums aggregating \$4005.38. In their bankruptcy petition, the officers of the company say the policies written by the company and on which the premiums have not been paid in full, may be disposed of to some other insurance company, increasing to that extent the assets of the concern.
