But a while after being placed in the hospital, Mr. Jones began having hemorrhages of the lungs, the stomach and the kidneys, which kept him in either an unconscious state or in a semi-conscious state during all of his confinement and at last caused his death. Mr. Jones was No. 2 of the Light House crew and had been at that place for a number of years. There being none of his relatives in this county, the body was given to the undertaker, who had it interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, Tuesday.

Stephens, wife of De Wayne Stephens, formerly of this city, passed away at their home, 447 Fifth Street, Portland, Oregon, last Saturday afternoon, tuberculosis being the cause of death. When a child, she came to this county with her parents and resided here until her marriage to Mr. Stephens. Beside her husband, Mrs. Stephens is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Wells; her sisters, Mrs. Carrie Marolf and Miss Gladys Wells; a brother, John Wells, all of this city and Harold Wells, a brother at Seaside. The body of Mrs. Stephens was brought to this city Wednesday on the Elmore. The funeral services were held from the Methodist Church this afternoon and interment made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Deceased was well known in this county and has many friends who mourn her untimely death.

GOOD RAILROAD NEWS.

P. R. & N. to Run Trains on Sept. 15th--Ready to Commence Work on United.

President E. E. Lytle, of the P. R. & N. Co., who has been superintending the work for several weeks expects to have the road finished by the 15th September, when a train service between Tillamook City and Portland will be established.

Attorney Jas. L. Conley, representing the United Railways, is in the city. Word is expected in Portland at any moment to commence work extending that line over the Wilson River to Tillamook City, and it is reported that 500 men are held in readiness in Portland to start work as soon as word is received from the East. It is expected that several camps will be started at different parts of the route and the road will be pushed through with a rush.
