Tillamook City was visited this week by officers of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., amongst whom were J. R. Davies, district superintendent; C. H. Moore, district commercial superintendent; W. H. Phillips, division commercial superintendent and M. Young, district engineer.

Dr. D. A. Sanburn, who recently came to this city, has been arrested for practicing medicine without a state license, and the case will not be tried until Tuesday. The state has a strong case against Sanburn, who, however, admits that he has not a state license, but claims that he heals by means of magnetism and frequent rubbing.

Jos. Effenberger vs. William Tohl, was a Nehalem case tried in Justice Stanley's court on Monday, which grew out of a misunderstanding between the parties. The justice tried to have the case settled out of court, but this could not be arranged. The suit was to recover \$31.08, but the misunderstanding was over the sum of \$16.48. The justice decided the case in favor of Effenberger.

C. W. Campbell, late of the Campbell Drug Co., of Spokane, Wash., opened his store at the corner of 2nd street and 2nd Avenue East, Tuesday morning. Mr. Campbell is a very pleasant man and thinks that Tillamook has a great future before it. With the fresh new stock which Mr. Campbell has on hand, he will undoubtedly share to some extent in the drug trade of this county.

The Sue H. Elmore came in on Wednesday with a full load of freight and a few passengers. She is bringing in freight for Nehalem, which is shipped up there on the railroad. She left this morning, her passengers being Mrs. Iler, Mrs. Lucy, Mrs. Evans, George Streeter and wife, W. Graydon and wife, A. W. Erckerbrack, Mrs. Fuller, Mamie Glaser, Mrs. B. C. Lamb and son.

Walter Wood, the contractor whose bid for the building of the new "Lamb Dock," was received by B. C. Lamb, has the work already under good headway. The dock will be 75x91 in the main body with an additional 10x125 along the water frontage, making the dock extend along the water front for the distance of 200 feet. The Lamb Dock will be used by the Pacific Navigation Co.'s boats and will be the best place of landing on the water front.

There are a number of pictures on exhibition in the store windows of King & Smith Co. and the Tillamook Feed Co., which are interesting as works of art, especially as it is local talent, and pupils of Mrs. Shrode who painted them. The local artists are Mrs. Emmett Bales, Mrs. Ira Smith, Mrs. Fred Poor, man, Mrs. Carris Kinnaman and Miss Hattie Walker. All the pictures show considerable ability on the part of the painters, some of whom undertook hard subjects to paint. There are also several pictures on exhibition which were painted by Mrs. Shrode, which are also creditable works of art.

Engineer Geo. L. Davis having severed his connection with the P. R. & N. Co., he has gone to Texas. Engineer Miller has taken his place and will see the road completed, which will only be a few weeks from now, as it is expected that trains will be running by the 15th of next month, that is if nothing happens to retard the work. In any event Engineer Miller thinks that it will not be later than the 25th September when trains will be running. Con-

tractor Sweeney has about finished work on the road, and with the road completed next month, there is liable to be considerable travel into this county this Fall.

The gasoline boat which has been under construction at the Peterson ship yards in this city since late spring was launched last Monday night at eleven o'clock. The craft, which is owned by Capt. Dodge and John A. White, is a very staunch built little boat, 46 ft. long, with 12½ ft. beam and between 3½ and 5 feet draught. She has a tonnage of 10 ton net or 14½ ton gross and is equipped with a H.P. standard make engine. The owners expect to use their boat for deep-sea fishing and coastwise trolling, and have planned to begin operation the 1st of September. Capt. Dodge, one of the owners of the boat, will be the master, and Mr. White, the other owner, will be the chief-engineer. The valuation of the boat complete is about \$3,000.

S. W. McFarland, who has been writing policies for the National Life Insurance Co. in this county the past summer, seems to have suddenly disappeared a couple of weeks ago. On Saturday, two weeks ago, he informed Dr. Boals, the physician for the company, that a number of people would be in, in a few days, to be examined. He also stated at that time that he would be gone from town for a few days but would be back in order to canvass the south end of the county. On Sunday he took the Henrietta for Bayocean and has not been heard of since. Mr. Crenshaw has taken charge of the search for the missing man but has been unable to learn anything of his whereabouts. Mr. McFarland has a wife and daughter who reside in Portland. It is thought by the Sheriff that he went East.

SUICIDE OF A TILLAMOOK YOUNG WOMAN.

Messages Are Sent to Friends Before Snakecharmer Takes Life.

BOISE, IDAHO, Aug. 16.—Grace Moreland, a snake charmer with a carnival company, who committed suicide here late last night in the Iberia Hotel, claimed as her home Tillamook Ore., where relatives are said to reside. The Coroner's jury today found that the young woman, who was but 20 years of age, killed herself by taking chloroform. Her grandmother, Mrs. Loretta Daily, is a resident of Portland and the body is being held pending instructions from her.

Despondency over the recent death of R. J. O'Donnell, a balloonist, is said to have been the cause of Miss Moreland taking her life. She had often spoken of O'Donnell, apparently her lover, since his untimely death. After attending a dance at the White City here last night Miss Moreland went to her room at the Iberia and took the deadly drug. Her body was found several hours later.

Two letters were left by the woman, one to Professor Miller of the carnival company, asking him to dispose of her personal belongings so that her body could be "laid beneath the sod," as she was tired of this "accursed life." The second was to George Patrick, prison guard, Presidio, San Francisco, bidding him good-bye.

Grace Moreland, the young woman who committed suicide, was the daughter of M. D. Redding, who was city marshal for several months this year. She ran away from home four years ago, and for a long time her father did not know where she had gone. It seems that she first went to Portland and then went to Corvallis and worked at an hotel there, where she became acquainted with the woman who was in the snake charming outfit which had visited this city a few months previous. She told the woman that she would like to get in if there was a show, and the woman quitting her job, the young woman was sent for and she became the snake charmer of the outfit until she ended her unhappy life by taking poison. She changed her name to Moreland.
