GENEROUS OFFERS.

Property Owners Contribute Liberally Towards Bayocean Road.

On Friday Mr. Irving B. Potter, of the T. B. Potter Realty Co., interviewed the County Court in regard to building a wagon road round the south side of the bay to Bayocean. He made a proposition to the Court, agreeing to construct about three miles of the road on their property, which would leave five miles for the county to build, and towards the county's part of the work his company would contribute \$5,000. The court made no promise that they would build the road, but thought that possibly they could appropriate about \$7,500 for the next two years towards the work.

As the court had already decided to have County Surveyor Jackson make a survey and estimate of cost, the matter was continued for the present, but it is the desire of the property owners that if it is decided to build the road that the contract be let as soon as possible, so as to get the road finished by next spring.

The T. B. Potter Realty Co. have expended a large amount of money and employed quite a large number of men since they took over the Bayocean property, and being large taxpayers as well, are entitled to a public road to their property, as are other property owners on the south side of the bay, who have paid taxes for years. Besides being heavy taxpayers, the company has had one of the biggest pay rolls in the county.

A subscription list has been started in this city, and those who have contributed are: T. B. Potter Realty Co., \$5,000 00 H. T. Botts, 500 00 George Higgins, 500 00 John Hathaway, 200 00 It is expected that there will be no difficulty as to obtaining free rights of way, as most of the property owners have signified their intention of signing a contract to that effect.

That afternoon the weather was freakish in the Willamette Valley, causing some surprise and disappointment to those who were attending the State fair, as the following will show:

Eugene—Hail piles 2 inches deep in streets; skylights broken, cellars flooded.

Albany—Five telephone poles knocked down by lightning; one telegraph pole struck.

At Woodburn—Barn destroyed by lightning; hophouse reported burned.

At Portland—Wind attains velocity 40 miles an hour; heavy thunder and lightning.

At Salem—Heavy rain drenches state fair visitors; electrical effects unusual.

At Gervais—Woman receives lightning shock, but lives; hay is damaged.

At Roseburg—Much damage done truck gardens and orchards.

Death of Mrs. R. M. Wade.

Word was received in this city on Saturday that the mother of R. L. Wade had died suddenly in Portland that morning. Mr. Wade was in that city at the time, and Mrs. Wade and children left on Sunday for Portland.

Mrs. R. M. Wade, pioneer of 1852, died suddenly from heart disease yesterday morning at her home, 400 Holladay avenue.

Mrs. Wade was the daughter of the late Jefferson Williams, a well known pioneer of Douglas County. She was born in Sullivan County, Missouri, in 1843, and at the age of ten crossed the plains to Oregon. The family settled at a place now known as Looking Glass near Roseburg. She was one of 13 children who grew to manhood and womanhood.

In 1857 Mrs. Wade was married to R. M. Wade and made her home at Auburn, Ore. In 1865, with her husband she moved to Salem, which continued to be her home until 1883, when they came to Portland. Mrs. Wade is survived by her husband, two sons and two daughters—Walter S. Wade, of Olex, Ore.; R. L. Wade, of Tillamook; Mrs. S. May Glafke and Mrs. Susan E. Newbegin, wife of Edward Newbegin, of Portland. Mrs. Wade was a member of the first Congregational Church of Salem.—Oregonian.

Taft Starts the 1912 Fight.

Charging Democrats and Insurgent Republicans in Congress with having played politics in their attempt at tariff legislation during the extra session, and singling out La Follette, Clark and Underwood for special responsibility, President Taft unexpectedly took the aggressive in the national campaign of next year involving his re-election when on Saturday, the 26th, at Hamilton, Mass., he addressed a gathering of the Essex County Republican Club. After referring to the passage of the reciprocity bill, with the aid of Democratic votes, the president voiced his views thus: "Our Democratic friends, however, were not content to allow the session to pass with the accomplishment of the purpose for which it was called. They assisted—most of them—in the passage of the reciprocity bill because they believed in its usefulness, and in so doing they united with the Republican support, and did not 'play politics' in its passage. I am very sorry to say, however, that having pursued a statesman-like course with reference to reciprocity, they did 'play politics' of the most irresponsible character in respect to three tariff bills, which, by uniting with certain Republicans in the Senate, they were able to pass and present to the executive for his signature. The bills bear internal evidence of the fact that they rested on a basis of not 'tariff for revenue only,' but 'tariff for politics only.'"

The president then charged Leader Underwood with having made false statements about the revenues of the country in presenting the wool bill to the House by saying that the 20 per cent was purely for needed revenues in a view of a deficit. Taft insisted that this was a mistake, and that there was in reality a surplus of \$40,000,000. Then tracing the passage of the La Follette compromise wool bill, Taft said it was a bill framed in ignorance of its effect and the product of political log-rolling. He asserted that earlier Clark, Underwood and La Follette had agreed with him in demanding a scientific tariff commission, and had deprecated revision without adequate data, but now they had gone ahead with the old unscientific method of revision. Nevertheless he wanted the country to understand that he and the Republican party fully intend to revise the wool schedule as soon as the board reports, and to do it on scientific lines. The extra session had afforded the country an opportunity to see the real purpose of the Democratic majority and of its coalition with the insurgents. Their action on the tariff, he intimated, was to be the main issue of the campaign of 1912.

FOILING THE PICKPOCKET.

What to Do When Your Hat is Tipped Over Your Eyes in a Crowd.

For a man there is only one really safe pocket, and that is a pocket which few men except experienced race goers have their suits supplied with. It is a breast pocket inside the waistcoat, and it should have a buttoned flap, for without the button even this hiding place is unsafe.

The second best place for carrying money is the trousers pocket, especially if the owner is rather stout. And the left hand pocket is better than the right. A skillful thief standing behind you may insinuate his right hand into your right hand pocket easily, but the left comes awkwardly to him.

For safety's sake the pickpocket seldom works single handed. He usually works with a couple of "screens," who plant themselves in front of the intended victim. If the "job" is a difficult one they carefully jostle him at the critical moment in order to distract his attention. This jostling is usually called "working the ramp."

A favorite trick in a dense crowd is to tip a man's hat over, as though accidentally. His hands naturally fly up to set it right. Instead they should go straight to the watch and the money pocket. If your hat is knocked off in a crowd make sure your money pocket is safe before troubling about the hat. If you are quick enough you may catch a hand there.

The trained pickpocket's fingers are almost as delicate and sensitive as those of a skilled pianist. To become an expert demands long practice. But the expert could with or without the shelter of a newspaper go through, one by one, every one of a man's twelve or sixteen pockets except that one inside the waistcoat if he knew it to be worth his while. Three years ago a man was sentenced for training young pickpockets. He used clothes dumplings with bells so arranged that they rang when the picking was clumsily done.—Exchange.
