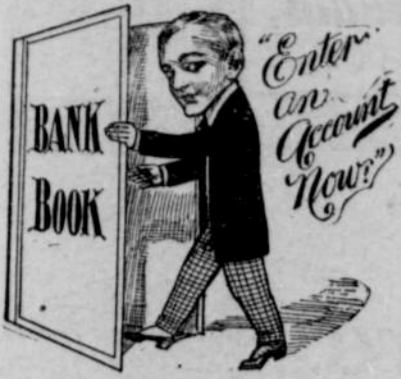

Perjury Charges Fail.

Warrants were issued on Saturday for the arrest of Chria Hansen, Charles Pike, John Longcor and Sam Bodle, charged with perjury, which grew out of the evidence given in the case against Axel Nelson, who was united in marriage to the Whitney Co. The case against Nelson centered as to whether certain islands connected with the tide lands, and each of these parties went on the stand and positively swore there were no channels between them, whereas the defence contended there were. An examination was made at low water on Saturday by Deputy District Attorney Willett, Sheriff Crenshaw, Justice Stanley and Attorney Holmes, when several feet of water were found at low water which divided the islands from the tide land.

The cases came up for hearing Saturday evening, and in the course of the hearing Attorney Johnson accused Deputy District Attorney Willett of being in the employ of the Elmore Co., which the latter indignantly resented, when an altercation between the attorneys took place, both of whom regretted it after it was over. On account of this Justice Stanley adjourned court until Monday, when he admonished the attorneys. After hearing the evidence the Justice dismissed the cases.
