

**LOOKING THROUGH WRONG GOGGLES.**

**Bay City and Fairview Join Hands to Stop Road in County Next Year.**

There was a meeting at Fairview on Tuesday, under the auspices of the Fairview Grange to consider county affairs. It seems that the Bay City Commercial Club was invited to take part, but no invitations had been extended to the Tillamook Commercial Club to participate in the deliberations, although the County Judge and Commissioners had been invited and were present. Quite a number of speeches were made, and resolutions were adopted with this object in view:

- 1st—To confine the road levy to 6 mills.
- 2nd—To put the County on a cash basis.
- 3rd—Close down on road work next year.
- 4th—Not to undertake any new road work.
- 5th—Employ a competent engineer to have charge of road work.

The resolutions to confine the road levy to 6 mills and not undertake any new road work was passed at a meeting of the Bay City Commercial Club and was introduced by the Bay Cityites at the Grange meeting, the purpose of which is to oppose the building of a road from this city to Bayocean.

The reasons that Bay City and Fairview have joined hand in a movement to suspend road work next year is told in few words. In the case of Fairview, there are no better roads in the county and they will not need fixing for a long time. These roads have cost considerable money and the farmers there have been paid more money for road work than any other district in the county. Other localities have had to wallow through almost impassable roads because of the lack of funds, although they have paid as much taxes as those residing in other parts of the county. We suppose it is human nature, however. One section having obtained all the good roads it needs, it cares little or nothing whether other sections obtain good roads.

Bay City, too, has gone on record to stop road work next year as well as opposed to any new work being undertaken. The object of this is to put a stop to the building of the road to Bayocean, and for a selfish reason, no doubt, for it will not benefit Bay City, for we understand that someone in that city has hit on a scheme to construct a dyke road across the mud flats on the bay and put in a draw bridge to cross the channel so as to reach Bayocean that way. What the cost of this project would be or whether the whole of a ten mill road tax would be sufficient to construct it has not been figured out yet. It is safe to say that the Bay Cityites did not broach this to the Fairview Grangers, for it would immediately have caused them to have the blind staggerers or set the leaders on the way path for the scalps of their new allies. It is, very remarkable that Bay City should want to close down on road work next year, when the Port of that place pledged itself to go the limit of ten per cent in bonding the Port for \$250,000, and for running expenses, maintenance, interest and sinking fund to pay off the principal, \$30,000 to \$35,000 will have to be raised annually by taxation, and most of this money is to go for a north jetty for the improvement of the bar, a project Engineer Lockwood advised the Port of Tillamook not to sink any of the people's money in. The Port of Bay City will have to levy a ten mill tax to meet these fixed charges for the improvement of the bar as long as the bonds are unpaid. Having pledged itself to go the limit in bonding for bar improvements, and being then forced to go the limit of ten mills for a Port tax, Bay City ought to show a more magnanimous spirit towards other portions of the county, especially when road improvements in all parts of the county are as essential, and more so, than the improvement of the bar. The Headlight is advocating a ten mill road tax so that the county can get on a cash basis in a few years and continue road improvements in all parts of the county, and to do this \$150,000 is required, but it is a small sum when it is proposed to bond the three Ports for about \$750,000 for water improvements, and with it a heavy annual tax amounting to ten mills. What inconsistency when Fairview hobnobbed with those who advocate this large expenditure for harbor improvements after contributing \$500 to pay a Portland attorney to bust up the Port law, with \$5,000 to be pumped up to take the case to the United States supreme court. Gee! It's more than laughable. It looks ridiculous.

This is a curious condition of affairs, as well as quite amusing, when not looking through Fairview

or Bay City goggles. What the settlers in other parts of the county, where they need good roads think of the Fairview-Bay City combination to deprive them of good roads, we can only imagine, or what the fair-minded, impartial and unprejudiced citizens would think of a County Court that would allow the roads to go to rack and ruin for 12 months after expending large sums of money to make them fit to travel over the other side of this question to be heard from.

If the Bay City-Fairview combination succeeds in its efforts, it will be the spring of 1913 before the county court will have any considerable money to do road work, for what little money is left from a six mill tax next year after the outstanding indebtedness on the road fund is paid off it will leave only enough money for emergency work. Just think of it: Allow the roads to go to rack and ruin and dump a big pile of money into harbor improvements. This is not the right system to run county affairs.

In regard to placing the county on a cash basis, the plan which the County Court is now working on is to bring this about by reducing the outstanding indebtedness about \$20,000 every year for the next few years, and by careful management of the finances, this arrangement would not stagnate road work nor hold back the county a year. It is for the citizens to say whether they prefer the County Court's or the Bay City-Fairview combine plan to place the county on a cash basis.

**A Question to Be Asked.**
