To EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.

Carl Haberlach of Tillamook, the Secretary Salesman for a number of the cheese factories in this county, is seemingly trying to boycott the Nehalem Dairy Ass'n judging from self evident facts. The law requiring the inspection of cheese is not applied to this factory by Inspector Christensen for some reason and therefore by instructions of Mr. Haberlach, every case of cheese that is shipped out from this factory is marked in large stenciled letters: NOT INSPECTED. It stands to reason that the sale of this cheese will be greatly impaired because of this fact and the patrons and stockholders will be the losers. If Inspector Christensen fails to do his duty as such officer there are others that will, and it is to be hoped that some action will be taken in the matter for the benefit of the farmers in Nehalem.—Nehalem Enterprise.

Dear Sir,—The above article appeared in the Nehalem Enterprise, issue of Sept. 29. The editor of that paper seems to be misinformed. In the first place there is no law compelling inspecting of cheese in this state. The Tillamook County Creamery Ass'n is a corporation in which a number of the co-operative factories of this county have stock, and the cheese manufactured at the Maple Leaf, Tillamook, Fairview, South Prairie, Three Rivers, Clover Leaf, Elwood, Long Prairie, Cold Springs, Central, East Beaver and Pleasant Valley, factories engage the services of Mr. F. W. Christensen to inspect and supervise the manufacture of cheese made at these factories, charging the several factories 1-10 of the one cent per lb. for the cheese made during the months of April, May, June and July. It is entirely a voluntary proposition and is done for the purpose of getting a first class, uniform article of cheese.

Second, the statement that the Nehalem cheese goes out marked "NOT INSPECTED" is not true. The two other factories at Nehalem and several other factories for which I act as salesman do not have their cheese inspected, largely because they are outlying and it is impossible for one man to look after all of them properly and thus far there are not enough factories in the ass'n to justify the employment of two men. I wish you would make this correction, for in no case do we have cheese go out marked "NOT INSPECTED." If cheese that is inspected does not reach the proper grade, it goes out in what are known as plain boxes, with out inspector's brand.

It seems that one of the renters was taking the bull down to the Ocean Park Farm, the Haberlach farm at Woods, leading him behind the wagon. The horses ran away, dragging the bull about one half a mile and the animal was so badly hurt that he had to be shot. He was sired by Jetho Bass, and was a grandson of Dolly Bloom, the world famous Guernsey cow. On his sire's side were Dolly Dimply, one of the very best cows of the breed, with a record of 906 lbs. of butter fat and a number of cows with records of over 600 lbs. Word was just received that a sister of the animal had qualified for entry in the head of class F., giving 669 lbs. butter fat as a 2½ year old. The animal could not be replaced for less than \$600.00 and was probably the best bred animal in the county.

MAYONNAISE.

The Way the Genuine Dressing is Prepared by French Cooks.

Housewives concoct all sorts of dressings—cooked and uncooked—which they call mayonnaise, but which are not properly entitled to that name. The genuine mayonnaise as prepared by French cooks is made by combining olive oil, egg yoke and vinegar without cooking in such a way that the mixture will not curdle. The proportions of these ingredients and the method of putting them together may be varied, and mustard and similar seasonings may be added, but fundamentally the real mayonnaise is always the same. The following rule will be found a good one:

Have ready one egg yolk, one scant cupful of olive oil, three teaspoonfuls of vinegar, a saltspoonful of salt, a saltspoonful of sugar, a light dust of cayenne and a level half teaspoonful of powdered mustard. Break the yolk with a fork, beat the mustard, salt, pepper and sugar into it and when a smooth mixture has been formed begin adding the oil, drop by drop, until the whole begins to look like creamed butter. Then pour in the oil faster until all is used. While the oil is being added the dressing should be beaten constantly with a fork. Last of all, pour in the vinegar very slowly, beating the dressing rapidly while doing so. Set it on ice to stand until wanted and add it to the salad the last moment before serving.

It is well to have everything very cold when making this dressing, although excellent mayonnaise has been made without the use of ice, but the oil must not be so cold that it has begun to thicken. It is sometimes stated that the drop by drop method is unnecessary, but while success may be obtained by putting the ingredients together more quickly it is always risky to do so. The drop by drop method practically insures success. If desired lime juice may be substituted for the vinegar.—Exchange.

FRENCH POLICEMEN.

They Can't Be "Fixed," and They Are Always Polite.

The laws of France relative to the out of door life of the masses are made in the interest of the people. Furthermore, they are enforced. There is no fixing things with a French policeman. If your bicycle has suddenly been twisted into junk by a careless driver the belted and brass buttoned gentleman who arrives on the scene questions you with intelligence and jots down in his notebook the facts of the occurrence as near as he can ascertain them. Throughout the interview he is polite, alert and painstaking in getting at the exact truth, and whether you or the offending driver or both accompany him to the police station, he conducts you with a quiet dignity and an air of fulfilling his duty. It does not make the slightest difference in France who you are or whether or not you have mutual friends or come from his "ward" or are a relative of Congressman So-and-so. If the other fellow is to blame you will be ushered from the presence of the commissaire de police with as much ceremonial politeness as would be shown at a diplomatic interview.

If it is boiling hot or freezing cold and you are in need of information, go to the nearest policeman, address him as "monsieur" and raise your hat. He will immediately return you a military salute, listen attentively and give you, as carefully as possible, the necessary information, saluting you again as you raise your hat to leave him.—F.
