Initiative and Referendum in Federal Supreme Court.

From the Spectator.

The most important case, to the people of Oregon, and to the people of the United States at large, pending in the United States Supreme Court is that of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company against the State of Oregon. It is on a writ of error from the Supreme Court of the United States to the Supreme Court of Oregon, and arose on an action at law brought by the State of Oregon against the company to recover a license tax on its gross earnings, claimed to have accrued for the year ending December 31, 1900, alleged to be due under an initiative law, passed by a vote of the people of Oregon June 4, 1900, requiring express, telephone and telegraph companies to pay an annual license tax upon their respective gross receipts.

The only question to be decided by the United States Supreme Court is as to whether the initiative and referendum amendments to the Oregon Constitution and state initiative law are valid, the company contending that they violate the Federal constitution and acts of Congress, particularly the act admitting Oregon into the Union. The main point however, is that the initiative amendments violate Section 4 of Article IV, which provides that: "The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government"—in other words, that the initiative and referendum amendments to the Oregon constitution make its form of government democratic and not republican in form and in substance.

The brief of the telephone and telegraph company in this case has but recently been printed. It covers 165 pages, and was written by Messrs. E. S. Pillsbury and Oscar Suetro, the San Francisco lawyers and of counsel for the company.

While technically a brief, in this particular case it is really a monograph of great merit. It is written with ability and shows great knowledge of the political history of the country and of its institutions. In it are cited excerpts from the debates in the constitutional convention, from the Federalist, from the other great writers, both native and foreign; from the speeches of great orators and from leading decisions of courts. It is a compendium showing what is a republican form of government, and especially what was intended to be meant by the words "republican form of government," as used in the National constitution. It shows that the division of power into three departments, viz., legislative, executive and judicial, in each of the states, is prerequisite to the existence of the national government; that state legislatures are a vital feature of our country; that under the National constitution in state legislatures are the agencies to carry on the relations between the nation and the states; that the initiative destroys the legislature and overthrows one of the greatest safeguards against the abuse of the power of legislature, to-wit: the system of a dual legislative assembly; and also does away with the further safeguard of the veto power by the governor.

It is to be regretted that this brief will not be largely circulated over the United States. It has been studiously, intelligently and carefully prepared and written. After a careful reading of it, anyone who is a believer in our form of government as framed and expounded by our great statesmen, will fully appreciate that, should the Supreme Court uphold the initiative and referendum amendments of the Oregon constitution, while its decision will be the law, these amendments are opposed to the traditions of the American people, to the spirit of the National constitution, and to the genius of our institutions.
