CLATSOP OFFICIALS VISIT TILLAMOOK.

Judge Judd a Good Roads Booster --- Advocates Bonding System.

THE NECARNEY ROAD.

One of the Most Scenic Roads in Oregon---Immediate Improvement Necessary for Next Year's Travel.

Judge E. C. Judd and Commissioner Fred Moore, of Clatsop County, and S. W. Gallagher, of the Imperial Restaurant, of Astoria, accompanied by Henry Tohl and C. L. Alley, of Nehalem, paid this city a visit on Tuesday. They were out on a visit of inspection, going over the road in the south part of Clatsop County, and were interested in the roads in Tillamook County which are to connect with Clatsop County.

They spent Tuesday evening at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms, and Judge Judd showed that he was a live and energetic good roads advocate, as well as a strong advocate for the improvement of the Necarney mountain road. He said it was one of the most scenic roads on the Pacific Coast, and in his judgment surpassed anything he had seen coming over the Canadian Pacific railroad. "You people ought not to lose any time in making that improvement," he said, and he suggested getting a gang of convict in from Salem to do the rock work. Besides keeping them, all it cost was 25c. per day for their labor. Clatsop and Columbia counties were making great progress on their part of the automobile road from Portland, and expected to have it completed in the spring, and as Tillamook County had some of the most beautiful scenery on the route, he was very anxious that this county do its part and improve the Necarney mountain road. He said it would surprise the citizens here the many thousands of visitors who would come to Tillamook over that road next year if it is fixed so that it can be used. When the railroad runs excursions Tillamook county will be alive with people. The Judge was immensely pleased with Garibaldi beach, and he predicted in a few years that it would be lined with thousands of cottages and that a great deal of building will be going on there for a number of years. All this added wealth to the county and helped to bear the burden of taxation. He congratulated Tillamook county on the lead it had taken in road building, and when informed that there was a movement on foot to curtail or stop road work he said it would be the greatest mistake the county could make. He is a strong advocate of bonding for road work, claiming that all big corporations got started in that way. He thought it only just that the present generation should enjoy the benefits of the good roads and the next generation would be in better shape to pay for them on account of the increased assessment in the counties. He thought that there would not be the least doubt, when Clatsop County votes on a bond issue, it will carry. They did not levy a general road tax in Clatsop County, the money coming from the general fund to build road, but each road district made a special road tax, and where the settlers showed a disposition to help themselves the county court helped them with money from the general fund, and where they did not they got very little help. Judge Judd told of certain individuals who had used a great deal of energy in getting good roads to their farms, but no sooner were they built when the very same persons object to carrying the improvements farther on the same road, and as a result of that a large Finn settlement had to pack their produce on pack horses from their farms several miles to where the road had been improved and then put it in their buggies and take it to market. He said the most unreasonable persons he had met with in road building were men who had obtained good roads themselves and were so unjust that they cared little or nothing about other persons or other sections of the county where they needed good roads. From what he could understand the county official in Tillamook County were meeting with the same difficulties with that class of people as they were. He thought the best way to overcome that difficulty was to go ahead and not take the least notice of that class of persons.

The Only Government Examined Bank in the County.

Their county at the present time was \$60,000 in debt and their county warrants selling at a premium, in fact, there was such a demand for them that they were bespoken months ahead. Another thing which Judge Judd impressed upon those who were talking to him was the necessity of a first-class hotel in Tillamook City. He recited the difficulties they met with in Astoria in not having a suitable hotel until recent years. This was one thing that Tillamook City must have if it expected to get the best class of people to stay in the city, which they will not do if they cannot get what they want. He had nothing to say against the present hotels. They were alright for present purposes, but they would not satisfy the demand of the thousands of visitors and tourists who would visit Tillamook City every year. He predicted that it would be a splendid investment and would pay well.

The party left early Wednesday morning on a visit to Bayocean, and then took the train for Nehalem at Garibaldi. They will go out over the Necarney mountain and inspect that road on their return to Astoria, leaving Nehalem this morning.
